

CATECHISM CORNER

Good and happy Sunday St. Francis Parish! Here we are! The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time! You may have heard about the "Eucharistic Revival". And your first question is: What is the Eucharistic Revival? Well, simply put, it is a three-year initiative that aims to inspire, educate, and unite. In a world where not many people know Jesus intimately, the revival is meant to show everyone what wonders the **True Presence** of Jesus can do to heal the soul. Through a carefully planned timeline of events, after three years, the U.S. bishops hope to change the lives of many Catholics and non-Catholics alike. There will be more information forthcoming along with information specifically for our parish. We ask Mary, the Mother of God, to pray for us as we enter into this Eucharistic Revival as a Church.

I had a question asked of me how Mary and Joseph traveled to Bethlehem. Did they travel alone or with a group and how long did it take them to get to Bethlehem? The Gospels leave out such details because, when they were written, everyone knew at the time how people traveled. So, we need to look at the time and places in history when this happened. Mary and Joseph, more than likely were part of a group and walked. Yes, walked! On the average, during this time in history, people would/could walk between 7 to 20 miles per day to their destination, but remember Mary was pregnant so I'm assuming they didn't walk that far every day. But Mary was on a donkey - right? Umm, maybe not because there is no mention of a donkey in the Gospels. You may ask where did this association with a donkey come from? Probably because of The Protoevangelium (first Gospel) of James, an ancient non-biblical account of Mary's life that is traced to the 2nd century. What we do know is that the journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem was 70-80 miles and that Mary was pregnant. It is not likely Mary would have been able to travel the full distance on foot even though she was in her late teens, strong and healthy peasant stock; even pregnant and near delivery she could have managed walking it. Other than walking, the means of travel at that time would have included donkeys, camels, horses, or some type of cart drawn by a horse. Since Joseph was not a rich man, it seems most likely that he would not have been able to get a camel, horse, or cart for use in their journey. It does seem possible that he would have owned, or been able to borrow, a donkey for Mary to ride upon during the journey to Bethlehem (let's hope so!).

These routes between cities were crowded with travelers. Nobody would consider taking a trip like this alone. It would not have been safe, as the territory between towns was not policed and bandits, pirates of the desert, and robbers would have been a real concern. The people probably traveled in great caravans for convenience and safety. I know I would have!! The consensus of many scholars states the journey takes four or five days as Nazareth is 65 miles north of Jerusalem (in a straight line), while Bethlehem is a hilltop town situated on a ridge near the edge of the Judaean desert, 5 miles south of Jerusalem. But as I stated previously, this particular journey may have taken longer due to the pregnancy and given the hostility between Jews and Samaritans, the caravan likely skirted those areas and went around the longer way. Whatever the "mode" of transportation might have been, the road was arduous, and their journey encourages us along our own spiritual journey to the feast of Christmas. With that being said, I do pray that this past Advent Season was a most "spiritual journey" for you! And that "inn" that is always portrayed, well that's for another Corner! \odot

Making a Plan to Waste Less Food

From the section on Global Inequality in his Laudato Si encyclical, Pope Francis tells us "we know that approximately a third of all food produced is discarded, and whenever food is thrown out it is as if it were stolen from the table of the poor" [LS 50]. This fact is backed up by research in the United States by the EPA and the USDA. Discarded food then becomes a major component of landfill waste (~22%), where it produces both CO2 and methane gas as it decomposes (methane being many times more problematic than CO2 at warming the environment). Our Week 29 Way to Care for Creation is to be more proactive regarding food waste at home, in our schools, our church, and the restaurants we visit. Planning ahead better, creatively using food waste, and home or municipal composting are excellent solutions.
