

# 4TH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME THE BEATITUDES

Throughout Scripture, we hear the consistent message that God does not operate in the ways the world imagines. God regularly proclaims a preference for the poor and oppressed and a special care for the widows and orphans. When God enters human exist-

ence, it is not as a triumphant king but as a vulnerable infant born in poverty. God offers us salvation not through a visible victory but through the apparent defeat on the Cross. God defeats death by going through death himself. None of this is how the world operates or how we like to see it work. God's ways are not our ways.



The Beatitudes of today's gospel make this explicit. Jesus here preaches the reversal of expectations, to which his whole life bears witness. In this world, we often think of those who are "blessed" as those who are safe and healthy, productive and successful, financially secure, and usually married with children. When we "count our blessings" we are usually counting external things such as these. It is not wrong to be grateful for these things; in fact, recognizing them as gifts from God can be an important spiritual practice. But Jesus insists that, good as these things are, they are not the point. His definition of blessedness has nothing to do with external things. The ones that Jesus calls blessed are defined by more internal characteristics, and the blessings they receive are not visible or worldly ones.

The invisible nature of this blessedness means that we might not get to know who among us has found favor with God. This is unsettling, because of course we want to know. But it is also good news, for all of us, because all of us are broken in some way. And what Jesus tells us here is that our brokenness, our lacks, our failures, none of these exclude us from blessedness.



# VOLUNTEERS—PLEASE NOTE! SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM

Many of our volunteers have not completed the Safe Environment Program (this program replaces Virtus, which was previously used by the Diocese). Those volunteers received an email on January 17 from Julie Dew and Kathy Meyerkord (our Safe Environment Site Administrators) asking that they complete the training and back-ground check. So far, only a few people that were contacted have completed the certification. If you have questions about any of this, please contact Kathy Meyerkord at the office. Volunteers who do NOT complete this will no longer be allowed to volunteer. This program takes about 1 1/2 hours to watch the videos and answer the questions. It does not need to be completed at one sitting. We'd like to have this completed by February 28. A reminder email will be sent in early February.

# **CATECHISM CORNER**

A most Happy and Blessed Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time! Our world is hurting. We all need healing, yet many of us are separated from the very source of our strength. Jesus Christ invites us to return to the source and summit of our faith in the celebration of the Eucharist. The National Eucharistic Revival is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. (from the eucharisticrevival.org) I've listed the internet site I obtain most of my information regarding the Eucharistic Revival. I hope you will visit!

I quote the Catechism of the Catholic Church book quite a bit. You may see me abbreviate this with the acronym CCC. I would like to briefly, and I mean briefly, explain what this wonderous book is! Ok, briefly it is a teaching tool with concise explanations of Catholic beliefs. The Catechism includes quotations from many papal encyclicals, church council documents, and the Scriptures. We are fortunate to have a couple of copies in our library! Feel free to borrow one or take one to keep.

Drawn up by the special Commission of Cardinals and Bishops established in 1986, the Catechism was approved and promulgated (proclaimed/to promote or make widely known) by Pope John Paul II. Presided over by Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger (YES! That's right – Pope Benedict!) this Commission worked diligently to fulfill the mandate it received. The Commission devoted particular attention to a study of many suggested changes to the contents of the text, which came from around the world and from various parts of the ecclesial (pertaining to the Church) community. The Commission seriously considered the suggestions offered (from ALL the bishops around the world through various synods held), carefully examined them at various levels and submitted its conclusions for the Pope's approval. These conclusions allow for a better expression of the Catechism's contents regarding the certain truths of the Catholic faith, and formulated in a way more suited to the requirements of contemporary catechetical instruction – all approved by the Pope!

Pope John Paul II stated: "This response (of the Commission) elicits in me a deep feeling of joy, because the harmony of so many voices truly expresses what could be called the "symphony" of the faith. The achievement of this Catechism thus reflects the collegial nature of the Episcopate; it testifies to the Church's catholicity." As we profess each and every Sunday: one holy, catholic and apostolic Church! The catechism faithfully and systematically presents the teaching of Sacred Scripture, the living Tradition (notice the capital "T") in the Church and the authentic Magisterium, as well as the spiritual heritage of the early Church Fathers, Doctors, and saints of the Church, which allows for a better knowledge of the Christian mystery and for enlivening the faith of the People of God which includes everyone – even non-Christians. You will see many, many quotes on the bottom of the pages from Holy Scripture and Church Fathers, Doctors of the Church and the saints.

I have used the CCC as a teaching tool for many years and I am in awe of the content! Thank you, Saint Pope John XXIII for making this your pastoral mission "to guard and present better the precious deposit of Christian doctrine in order to make it more accessible to the Christian faithful and to all people of good will." And Saint Pope John Paul II for your commitment in fulfilling this important mission for your predecessor. Saint Pope John Paull II and Saint Pope John XXIII, pray for us.

Take and keep the Laudato Si Pledge Part 1

Regarding environmental damage and destruction, Patriarch Bartholomew of the Eastern Orthodox Church wrote in 2003, "We look for solutions not only in technology but in a change of humanity; otherwise we would be dealing merely with symptoms. (We are asked) to replace consumption with sacrifice, greed with generosity, wastefulness with a spirit of sharing, an asceticism which "entails learning to give, and not simply to give up. It is a way of loving, of moving gradually away from what I want to what God's world needs [LS 9]. Our Week 31 Way to Care for Creation is to internalize part 1 of the Laudato Si Pledge- to pray for and with creation: "for creation" because so many areas need healing, and "with creation" because our lives are intimately interconnected with its gifts, its beauty, and its Maker.
