PASTOR'S NOTES

6TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In the Old Testament, God revealed himself and gave direction to his people through the law and the prophets. The law began with the Ten Commandments that were given to Moses on Mount Sinai (Exodus 20).

As the Word of God who came into the world, Jesus is the fulfillment of all the things God had spoken about through the law and prophets. The word “fulfill” means to make complete, or to complete what is lacking. In this text the word “fulfill” is expanded to include the perfecting of something that is imperfect. Jesus recognized that the laws of Moses and the prophets were good but imperfect. Thus he came “not to abolish them but to fulfill them” and said that anyone who relaxed even “the least of these Commandments... shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven” (Matthew 5:17, 19).

Matthew’s gospel goes on to identify six areas in which the law was to be perfected and fulfilled: Murder, adultery, divorce, oaths, revenge, and love of enemies.

Jesus said that unless our righteousness exceeded that of the scribes and Pharisees, we would never enter the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 5:20). He was telling us that being right with the Lord does not depend solely on refraining from acts prohibited by the law, but on the condition of our hearts in our relationships with our neighbors and with God.

Instead of feeling self-satisfied because we are not murderers, let us examine our hearts to see the angers or resentments we may have toward others. Our resentments and hatred, even though we hold them in check, violate the greatest commandment Jesus taught us: Love of God and love of neighbor (Matthew 22: 37-40). Our proper response is clear: we need to repent and be reconciled (Matthew 5:24). It is not enough to say, “I should not be angry with my spouse or children or teacher. I should not be jealous of that co-worker. I should not resent my boss for correcting me or for not appreciating the things I do.” The kingdom of heaven calls for reconciliation, not just an acknowledgment of wrongful thoughts or acts.

Matthew’s Gospel portrays Jesus as the Messiah who inaugurated the long-awaited kingdom of God. In the Sermon on the Mount, he first describes the Beatitudes. Then, like a new Moses, Jesus introduced a series of principles that characterized the messianic reign.

In the light of this kingdom, Jesus taught his followers how to live so that the life of God would take root and grow in their lives. He spoke about many of challenges we face in our daily lives: The call to righteousness, turning away from anger, swearing, revenge, and the need to love our enemies.

To live up to this new way requires an inner work of the spirit. Through faith we can experience the power to love others as Christ loved us. Let us ask the Lord to give this grace to all of us.

CATECHISM CORNER

A most blessed Sunday to everyone! When we present ourselves for Eucharistic Adoration, during this time of prayer, we simply trust in the Lord's love for us and the whole world. To further "talk" about prayer, I would like to suggest some "Tips for Praying":

- Find a quiet place and time. Prayer can be done anywhere but it is good to have a place that is conducive to relaxing and focusing our attention on God. Finding a regular time to pray each day can also be helpful to making prayer an important daily routine – it's all about routine.
- Calm yourself and put away distractions. It is important to be relaxed when we pray by finding a comfortable posture.
- Use formal prayers or speak what you feel to God, or a combination of each. It is important to note that there is no "right" way to pray. Experiment with styles and forms of prayer. Prayer is an ongoing, developing relationship with God.
- Take time to listen. God does speak to us in prayer but we need to listen with our hearts. Be open to what God is telling you rather than just on what you want to or expect to hear.
- Use the Bible in your prayer.
- Keep a journal of prayer.
- Have a proper attitude. Prayer requires openness to God and a desire to worship and get to know God better.

Meditative Prayer: Meditation is one of the many styles of prayer. This particular prayer is one of the ways used in "Lectio Divina"! Meditation engages our head and heart in seeking a deeper union with God. It enables us to slow down and quiet our hearts so that we can hear God's voice and communicate with God in a deeper way. Meditation can last a few minutes or hours. It can strengthen our relationship with God and allow us to get in touch with ourselves.

The process of meditation can involve several steps:

- Find the time and place which is conducive to meditation. It is important to pick a time when one is alert and able to focus and a comfortable and quiet place.
- Prepare to pray by relaxing your body so that you can devote your attention to prayer. Some people use muscle relaxing exercises and breathing exercises.
- Choose a word or phrase to focus your attention on God. Some people use "Jesus" or "Abba" or "Jesus saves" or "Jesus loves me."
- Connect the word or phrase with your breathing. Silently repeat the word or phrase in tune with your breathing. Let the word resonate within you. The repetition helps to focus on and remain open to God's presence. If you become distracted, focus again on repeating the word or phrase.

To strengthen our relationship with our God, just like any friend we need that time in conversation. I hope these "tips" help you!
