#### 7TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The first reading of the Book of Leviticus reminds us that we are to be holy as God is holy. The people of God will be recognized and distinguished because of their behavior. This behavior is best observed by responding to the great commandment of love. The commandment to love one's neighbor in Israel meant to love a fellow Israelite. Jesus in his expanded love extended neighbor to include one's enemies.

Last week we heard in the Gospel more specifically what Jesus meant when he said he came to perfect the law. In reference to the fifth commandment, "You shall not kill," he taught us we should not even be harboring hateful and murderous thoughts and desires within ourselves. In a similar way he spoke about the sixth commandment, "you shall not commit adultery."

Today's gospel continues this pattern. The law of talion, which Jesus refers to today, an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth, was meant to impose some sense of justice and fairness. A person could exact revenge only to the extent to the damage imposed. Jesus carries the law much further, in telling us not to try to take revenge at all. He insists that love has to go beyond what is demanded, it has to go beyond just loving people we are supposed to love or enjoy loving. It's not easy to do but we have his example to show us how it can be done.

Jesus sums up this section by saying you must be perfect as your heavenly Father if perfect. It is impossible for any of us, as wonderful as we may be. What Jesus is asking of us is that we should all be trying to get closer to God, by our relationship with God and by our love for one another. That is the same thing that Moses is saying in the first reading "be holy, for I the Lord your God am holy" and this is a process. In other words, we are perfect when we keep growing, we keep maturing, we keep moving forward in God's direction. When we stop moving forward spiritually, when we decide to put God off to some time when we're "not so busy," when we say for example, there's nothing special I need to do in Lent, there's no way I need to change for the better, or it is not worth the effort, then we become stagnant spiritually. That is bad. For the development of our spiritual life is our most important purpose in life. Our material possessions we will leave behind some day. Our bodies will decompose. The only thing we will be able to hold on to when this life is over is the good works we have done and the relationship with God we have formed.

We want to be like God in possessing some of God's qualities: like joy, love, peace, eternal life. We have to work to be like God in other ways, especially in our everyday lives and in everyday dealings with one another. And the only way we can get started in this direction is through prayer. We need to reflect on God's word, we have to provide for ourselves moments of quiet where we can possibly hear God's word in our hearts.

There are many brothers and sisters who do not realize the immense love of God for them, and of the power of that love to do them good, to bring them happiness. If you are looking for something special to do during this Lent, if your life is in such perfect order in every way and you can't think of anything you can do to make it better, I would suggest taking some extra time to pray.

## **CATECHISM CORNER**

Dear Parishioners of St. Francis of Assisi,

Please pray for our bishops and the countless men and women who are serving this movement of the Eucharistic Revival! I especially ask you to pray for our parishioners Jackie Wagner and Karen Messenger who have volunteered to guide us!

This coming Wednesday we will be celebrating Ash Wednesday; which is the beginning of Lent. I've written before about the three disciplines of Lent: fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. During Lent, I will try to elaborate more on each one and how we can incorporate these into our everyday lives.

The word "Lent" comes from the same root word as the word lengthen. Lent is an old Anglo-Saxon word for springtime, when daytime lengthens rapidly. Lent is the Church's springtime of our "Life in the Spirit". This very holy time of the Church year and has been practiced since the earliest times of the Church. For instance, St. Irenaeus (d. 203) wrote to Pope St. Victor I, commenting on the celebration of Easter and the differences between practices in the East and the West (another topic for the Corner!). This time is when, during the 40 days before Easter, the catechumens repented, studied, and sacrificed intensely. This was the only time during the year that the Sacrament of Baptism took place! When infant Baptism became common, Lent became a time of repentance and renewal for all Christians.

The days of Lent are often compared to a journey, a journey which gives us an opportunity to imitate Jesus as He fasted forty days in the desert preparing for His service to His people. So, this means at the end of Lent we expect find ourselves somewhere different than where we started. Lent is a time for strengthening our Catholic Faith, a time to reflect on who we are and where we are going. It is a time of quiet and prayer, a time of penance and meditations, a time to become aware of our strengths and weaknesses. On Ash Wednesday, we are marked with the sign of the cross on our foreheads. These come from the palms blessed for Passion Sunday last year. Ashes.....death and life...In autumn ashes declare death. The harvest is complete and what remains is burnt. In the spring ashes announce life. When the earth awakens, ashes are spread to nourish new growth. These ashes on our forehead signify mortality, mourning and penance. We have chosen to join in the drama of death and life, not to impress others, but because we intend to walk with Jesus.....the Lamb of God.

Lent highlights and illumines that which should be the agenda of every day of our lives: a complete turning of our lives and our hearts to God, a true sense of sorrow for sin, and participation in our baptismal life which is ultimately, participation in the paschal mystery of Jesus Christ.

I look forward to journeying with you during the next 40 days. May God bless you abundantly on your journey of Lent.

Reduce Energy Usage for Lent

In his 2011 book, The Rough Guide to Climate Change, the meteorologist Robert Henson states that "a warming planet is liable to produce a cascade of repercussions for millions of people who have never started up a car or taken a cross country flight". These brothers and sisters of ours across the globe are indeed dealing with epic droughts and epic flooding caused by climate change. This is a huge issue of social justice for us believers who think nothing of our daily energy consumption, not realizing how outsized we live and the connection to those repercussions. This Lent, let us consider reducing energy consumption by "avoiding the use of plastic and paper, reducing water consumption, separating refuse, cooking only what can reasonably be consumed, showing care for other living beings, using public transport or car-pooling, planting trees, turning off unnecessary lights" [LS 211]. All important practices!
