

## PASTOR'S NOTES

#### 5TH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME

"You are the salt of the earth," Jesus says. 'You are the light of the world." In two phrases, Jesus describes the identity and mission of his followers.



In today's first reading, the prophet Isaiah offers practical ways to make this happen. "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the

homeless; clothe the naked when you see them, and do not turn your back on your own. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn." Tangible love offered to people who need it most: this is what it means to be light for people in darkness and salt for people who need a taste of hope.

Jesus' words about salt and light come in his sermon of the Mount. In this sermon, Jesus says our words and speech matter; we are not meant to hide the truth with double-speak or empty phrases. In this sermon, Jesus says that the way of peacemaking and reconciliation, of faithfulness in relationships, of love for enemies and prayers for persecutors is what it means to live as salt and light.

When Christians choose gospel influence over any other kind of power and give ourselves away to others, then the world will see that the church is a living and real presence of God who gave himself in love for the world. Then the world will be seasoned properly to keep it from decay and so that others can taste the goodness of the Lord. Then our light will "shine before others that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father."



### SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM UPDATE

#### **CATECHISM CORNER**

Happy Sunday St. Francis of Assisi! "An exciting journey ahead" as quoted by the National Eucharistic Revival. Our world is hurting. We all need healing, yet many of us are separated from the very source of our strength. Jesus Christ invites us to return to the source and summit of our faith in the celebration of the Eucharist. This journey is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist.



When I think of the Eucharist, I think of the greatest prayer – the Mass. I have been asked what are the "different" forms/types/kinds of prayer. There are Four Basic Forms of Prayer. Let's take a brief look.

- Prayer of Blessing and Adoration: In this prayer we express praise and honor to God. We praise God for giving us life, for the wonder and beauty of our world, and for all the many blessings we enjoy. We open ourselves up to praise God for all the wonders of creation. This form of prayer encourages bodily expression, such as standing with arms raised.
- Prayer of Petition: This is probably the most familiar prayer form of prayer. We are often asking God for the things we need, but asking and praying for them are not necessarily the same. When we pray our petitions, we are asking God, who loves us very much, for something that we believe is good—for ourselves or for others. By using this form of prayer, we are mindful of the needs of others as well as of our own needs. We are aware that God wants us to bring our problems and worries to prayer knowing that he will always hear and answer those prayers. God may answer our prayers in a different way (hard to accept) and in a different timeframe (harder to accept!) than we are seeking but God will always give us what we need.
- Prayers of petition: serves to remind us that God expects us to care for one another and for all his creation. We can pray about the ordinary experiences of life— for people who are sick, for someone who needs a job, for help in our school work, for a safe trip (I frequently do! I think St. Christopher is tired of "hearing" from me!). We pray for peace in our families and in our world. We can also express our sorrow and contrition to God in our prayer.
- Prayer of Intercession (asking for what others need): This form of prayer is prayer on behalf of
  others. This form of prayer can be a source of blessing upon others, the Church, and our world. Because we know that Our Lady and the saints intercede for us before God, the Church encourages us
  to pray to them for their intercession. Such prayer can bring us great strength and courage and also
  great peace of mind and heart.
- Prayer of Thanksgiving (for what God has given and done): This form of prayer helps us to be grateful for God's many blessings, spiritual and temporal, and helps us to recognize and appreciate all the good things God gives to us. Reserving some time to praise and thank God for his gifts—the gift of life; the gift of our families and friends; the gift of food, clothing, and shelter; and the numerous other gifts we often take for granted—helps us to form a true spirit of gratitude.

Remember that prayer is "conversation" with our Lord! Have a beautiful week!

### "The Best Gift to Give Your Loved Ones" - End of Life Planning February 11, 2023; 10:00AM – 2:00PM; All Saints Parish Hall

We will host three speakers, Janie Mc Cullah, Licensed Funeral Director at Click funeral home, our very own Fr. Doug Owens, and Paul Simoneau Vice Chancellor for the Diocese of Knoxville

### "The Mystery of Suffering and End of Life Decisions"-Paul Simoneau

Church's teachings on the salvific meaning of human suffering, care for the seriously ill, and end of life decisions. Important distinctions are made between that which is considered "ordinary care" (e.g., nutrition, hydration, basic care and comfort) and "medical treatment," and the principles that help us to discern between what is obligatory treatment and that which is optional. The subject of palliative care (treating pain) and that of the use or withdrawal of life-sustaining procedures will also be covered. The presentation will walk participants through the diocesan approved "Advance Care Plan" (what many call a Living Will) and "Assignment of a Health Care Agent" (someone who can make medical decisions on your behalf should you be incapacitated). Throughout this presentation, the spiritual meaning of this important part of life's journey will be highlighted. Packets of information and resources will be provided.

### WEEK 32—52 WAYS TO CARE FOR CREATION from laudatosimovement.org

Take and keep the Laudato Si Pledge Part 2

Part Two of our Laudato Si Pledge reads (simply)- live more simply. What can this short phrase or prayer mean to those of us who have been so showered with abundance in our lives? "People may well have a growing ecological sensitivity but it has not succeeded in changing their harmful habits of consumption which, rather than decreasing, appear to be growing all the more. A simple example is the increasing use and power of air-conditioning" [LS 55]. The term "overconsumption" may bring to mind shopping bags and large houses with overflowing closets, but more accurately, it is our common and pervasive use of energy that harms the earth through pollution and emissions, and creates wide gaps between global haves and have-nots (ourworldindata.org). All of us living more simply can relax the strain on the earth's resources and its ability for renewal.
