5TH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Today's liturgy has far-reaching implications for the life of ministry within any parish. The readings are rooted in self-sacrificing love. All of our love is to flow from the example of Christ

As the Christian church grew, there was a need to adapt community mores to meet the needs of the newly formed community. There were Greek-speaking converts, Greek-speaking Jewish converts, and Jewish Hebrew-speaking converts – all of them Christian. The church had to adapt and adjust to the influx of new people. Enculturation was a problem for the Jews as well as the Christians. The Greek-speaking Christians felt that their widows were given less than their Jewish counterparts. To solve the problem the apostles invited the Hellenists (Greeks) to appoint seven of their own men to take on the task of waiting on the tables of the entire community. The apostles prayed and laid hands on them.

In today's second reading, St. Peter tells us that we are to be living stones, built into a spiritual house, a holy priesthood to offer spiritual sacrifices. The church building is a structure that, at its best and most profound, speaks of a greater reality: the mystery of Christ's eternal love, which is celebrated and shared within it. We who gather are living stones, drawn into union with Christ through the saving acts in which we participate here. The church building provides a place in which the church, the Body of Christ, may come together.

In today's gospel Jesus speaks of a different dwelling, the Father's house, in which there are many dwelling places, the abiding place of God heaven. But as hopeful as dwelling with God throughout eternity is, the disciples were confused. How can they go to an unknown place? How can they know the Father, whom they have not seen? We can almost hear the exasperation and the frustration in Jesus's voice as he expresses one of the great mysteries of our Christian faith. When we know Jesus, we know the Father. Where the Father is, so is the Lord. They dwell in perfect union with one another, and so, as people who have been drawn to Christ in baptism and are nourished in this union with the Eucharist, we too know and may call God our Father. This union is a deep mystery that is at the very heart of what it means to be a Christian.

It was not easy for early Christians to learn to form community with one another, nor is it easy for us today. We live in a culture that prizes the individual – me first, every person for him- or her-self. Yet, here, we are formed in a different way, Christ's way, the way of love. Sacrificial love. A love in which we know ourselves united to one another and to all humanity, charged with sharing in mission of Christ, to make God's love known through our works, words and actions. The sacrifices we make for the sake of others have spiritual meaning. When we sacrifice – sharing love, care, our lives, and resources – we give of ourselves in response to the one great sacrifice of love of Jesus, the crucified and risen Lord.

CATECHISM CORNER

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Easter! This Catechism Corner we will be focused on the Corporal Works of Mercy of: Visit those in prison and Comfort the Sick. Please note that by visiting those in prison I am not implying the phrase of: "being soft on crime." On the contrary, there are some crimes that their perpetrators must be completely and irrevocably quaran-



tined, put behind bars for a long time or even for life for the protection of society and hopefully to deter other criminals. With some violent criminals, society has little choice but to "lock them up and throw away the key." Throw away the key, indeed – but not the *person*. Punishment deters and quarantines give the criminal the opportunity to do penance, but friendship and prayer have the capacity to reform and to heal. A true work of mercy is done by Christians who befriend those in correctional institutions in the name of Jesus Christ, thereby affirming their human dignity as persons made in God's image. A perfect example of prison ministry is Charles Colson, the former Watergate conspirator. Look him up – a pretty interesting story of his conversion.

The sixth Corporal Work of Mercy is to Comfort the Sick. To comfort the sick means, first of all, to comfort them with something they urgently need: namely, proper medical assistance. The Diocese of Knoxville has a mobile clinic called St. Mary's Legacy Mobile Clinic which serves rural East Tennessee communities. If you have a background in medicine, please think about volunteering for this wonderful and very much needed service right here in East Tennessee. Another way to serve God's people with the talent you have been given! Of course, there are some people who are "sick" not from physical illness but from social isolation. One thinks especially of the elderly in our communities who, whether at home or in long-term care facilities, live in geographical isolation from their loved ones. "Visiting the sick" in our world can mean reaching out to those in our local long-term care facilities who are "sick at heart" from being lonely and forgotten and who are regularly deprived of the basic human need called "friendship." The socially isolated elderly are usually not far away. They often live just around the corner from us, or they are members of our own parish. You could volunteer with the Meals-on-Wheels program and you will find them! Check with Father Antonio or Suzie Fay (our Pastoral Care group leader) if they know of anyone that needs visiting in the parish. Most of all, do not forget that some of them may even be members of your own family, relatives too much overlooked and too often forgotten.

Visiting the housebound elderly and the chronically and terminally ill is no easy task. Trying to do it on a regular basis can take us right out of our "comfort zones" because it confronts us with real human lives and the fragility of our humanity. But our mere presence, as someone willing to be a friend and a listening ear, can mean much more to them than we can imagine, and along the way they will be giving a precious gift to us as well: the gift of growth in the virtue of compassion and mercy is the fruit of compassion! We are blessed here at St. Francis because our Little Church on the River has a "sick and homebound" ministry – check it out!

Next week, St. Francis, we will concentrate on the Corporal Work of Mercy to Bury the Dead.

Ecological Virtue 1- Praise

Of all the ways to care for creation, starting with "praise" for the wonders, beauty, and complexities God designed out of His goodness is essential. It is the first and foremost of the seven Laudato Si ecological virtues, identified by Father Joshtrom Kureethadam of the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development. It is the theme of the magnificent Canticle of the Creatures [LS 87] written by Saint Francis of Assisi around 1224. Jesus himself praised His Father for the lilies of the field (Matthew 6). And it is the foundation upon which so many psalms rest: "Oh Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have wrought them all, the earth is full of your creatures." (Psalm 104: 24). Our intentional praise for God's works creates the needed mindset for prayer, awareness, and action against destruction of the environment. Starting each day with contemplation and praise will go a long way in setting us on a more sustainable path.
