11TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Almost daily in our television news we see suffering crowds of people. They are the victims of war, ethnic cleansing, floods, or famine. Millions of God's people are refugees without decent human housing and food. Among these crowds are millions of children, child laborers, child prostitutes, and the abandoned baby girls. For all of these, just as for the crowds in today's gospel, surely Jesus' heart "is moved with pity." Just as he

called his apostles, Jesus is calling us to be laborers for the harvest, to have compassion for the world's suffering people.

Matthew in this gospel is, in a way, summarizing the entire biblical story – yes, the story that begins in Genesis and concludes with the establishment of the New Jerusalem in the Book of Revelation. In Genesis we learn how humanity became alienated from God, its Creator. God did not abandon humanity, however. Beginning with Abraham and Sarah, God called and guided a people that would heal all humanity of its addiction to sin. We read on in the Bible how these chosen people struggle to live out their calling to reconcile the world to God.

Matthew tells of how Jesus is moved with pity because the people he encounters seem like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus takes on the role of his Father, wanting humanity to be truly free. Knowing that he is only one person, Jesus calls twelve of his disciples, symbolic of the twelve tribes of Israel, and gives them a mission. What was done before is now being done anew in Jesus Christ.

Our church has a long story of missionary work. Members of religious orders and lay women and men have given their lives to witness to Christ's message. And in this missionary endeavor, believers have worked for human dignity, against indecent housing, poor sanitation, and disease. All of these people were moved by the same faith and compassion that touched the heart of our Lord.

Certainly not all compassionate believers are able to become missionaries in other lands. You can always pray for missions, work for the missions and support economically the missions. During the last twenty years I have been able to do missions in a little town in Colombia, Marsella. It is a wonderful, rather safe place to experience some of the different situations of poor people. People know us, love us, and take care of us. We are open to those who want to come to this mission, pray for the mission, or generously support this mission. We know that all Christians, men and women, through the centuries have been witnesses to Christ's mission. They have been ordinary people of faith whose very lives have announced that "the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Faith engenders faith. Jesus' words to his apostles and to us are very clear, "Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give."

CATECHISM CORNER

In today's Catechism Corner we will be "discussing" the Spiritual Work of Mercy to "Counsel the Doubtful." What does this mean? How can we live this work of mercy? Reflect about the tremendous gift it is from The Divine Mercy when you find someone who really listens to you, who really lets you pour out your heart and share your troubles and miseries, and who then really takes your whole situation in prayer to the Lord before presuming to dole out advice to you. Plenty of people are quick to give out half-baked, ill-considered advice. But how many people do you know who really listen to you and to the Holy Spirit before they speak?

To elaborate: many people today are confused. They might be looking for meaning in their lives, for answers to the biggest questions (Why do I exist? Is there a purpose for my life? What is my calling in life?, etc.). Sometimes, a person simply needs someone that they can talk to, that they can "bounce ideas off." If we are willing to listen, we have the first tool for living this work of mercy.

But being a good listener is not enough. It is also important that we understand the context of a person's questions. Where are they coming from? What was their childhood like? Do they have a strong family support system? Do they have a religious background? Do they currently practice their faith, and is it the Catholic Faith?

All of this is important if we are to be able to provide good counsel. Why does it matter? Because we have to know where a person IS, if we are to help him/her to find the way to where he/she is GOING. Our goal in life is to get to heaven, to spend all eternity in the presence of Almighty God. The ultimate goal of "Counsel the Doubtful" is to help the person who we are counseling to find Jesus Christ, who is the Way, the Truth and the Life. When they find the Lord Jesus, and embrace Him and His Teachings as the Way, they will find the real meaning and purpose in life.

In what practical ways can we counsel the doubtful? I have a few suggestions:

- Be a good listener and provide counsel to our own children, and other children within our circle of family and friends.
- Be a good listener to those struggling in their marriages, and encourage them to seek to base their marriages more perfectly on Christ.
- Be a good listener to those who are struggling with unplanned pregnancies, and help them to see their unborn child as a blessing from the Creator, rather than as a burden to be eliminated.
- Be a good listener to those struggling with various emotional struggles, and help them to turn to the
 Lord Jesus for healing of their emotions. It helps if we understand the way our emotions are supposed to work. Helpful writings of Dr. Conrad Baars (healing of neurosis) Dr. Theresa Burke (healing
 of emotional wounding from abortion) and Dr. Joseph Nicolosi (healing of homosexual attractions).

Above all, when we are seeking to practice the Spiritual Work of Mercy to Counsel the Doubtful, we need to pray to the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Truth, so that we may be open to His Guidance — so that the Holy Spirit can speak through us to give guidance to those in need of good counsel. AMEN to that!

As you read here, being a good listener is above all the most important element in a good relationship! Please reflect on this: listening is much more than simply hearing......have a most blessed week St. Francis!

Ecological Virtue 7- Humility

Nature is filled with words of love and awe. How many times have we looked at a sunrise, the backdrop of mountains, or a surprisingly colored insect, and seen God's creation expressed anew? How awesome God's expressions of love are through His creation, and it brings a sense of humility to our way of thinking about the world. "As the rising sun is clear to all, so the glory of the Lord fills all his works" (Sirach 42:16). Most of us are realizing that we cannot take these expressions for granted, as there are factors threatening their quality and quantity, usually due to human activity (un.org/en/climatechange). We realize we need to take responsibility. "This responsibility for God's earth means that human beings, endowed with intelligence, must respect the laws of nature and the delicate equilibria existing between the creatures of this world, for "he commanded and they were created; and he established them for ever and ever; he fixed their bounds and he set a law which cannot pass away"" (Ps 148:5b-6) [LS 68].
