THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

Today we celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity – Three persons – One God. The Holy Trinity is about relationship, God in three persons living in total union and communion. They are indeed one, while remaining three distinct Persons.

In our first reading from the book of Exodus, Moses returns to Mount Sinai and is given new tablets to replace those he broke after first receiving God's covenant, when he re-

turned only to find people worshiping idols and living in debauchery. As expressed in several dialogues between God and Moses, what is revealed is God's desire to be in relationship with his people. The law is not so much given as "a list of thou shalt not;" rather, by being faithful to the law, the Israelites will be in right relationship with their God. The Ten Commandments are a blueprint for being in right relationship.

Our Lord is a "merciful and gracious God. Slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity." He is a God who forgives our faults and shortcomings over and over again because he is love. Paul continues to express this unconditional love in his second letter to the Corinthians when he writes, "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit."

Our God, the Holy Trinity, is not a God of division and conflict. God will only dwell in our midst if we are willing to live in communion, in peace, and in forgiveness in imitation to the Trinitarian Godhead.

Our gospel reading continues to emphasize love and relationship. God has an intense desire for a relationship with God's creation. God does not wait for us to turn to God or become God's friends. Instead, even when we are enemies, God demonstrates God's love for us by sending God's only-begotten Son, Jesus, to suffer and die for us.

God invites us to live in the reality of God's love – to know that we are forgiven and that there is nothing we need to do in order to impress God. God invites us to live in the new relationship that we have with God because of what Christ did for us. We are able to live each day in the knowledge of God's love, knowing that God is present in our lives and loves us unconditionally. As we celebrate Trinity Sunday, we are filled with gratitude that God has touched our lives with God's love and that we will never be the same. May we always be one with God in loving relationship.

CATECHISM CORNER

Welcome St. Francis to the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity! The Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Three Persons – one God – the Trinity. A fundamental belief of all Christians, but hard to explain and not mentioned in the Bible anywhere! If we think about the Trinity as a "relationship" a Greek word called oikonomia describes the Trinity accurately, which in turn is composed of two words: oikos, which is usually translated as "household"; and nemein, which is best translated as "management and dispensation." Kinda like the "family business." "The inner workings of the Blessed Trinity is relationship: the Father pouring out His love to His Son, the Son reciprocating that love as He pours it back into the Father and They do it to the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity, the Celestial AT&T – the Holy Spirit!" as told by Father Chapin from his Daily Living television show. I believe that St. John of Damascus explained the Holy Trinity best by comparing the Father to the big yellow sun, and the rays from the sun as Jesus, and the warmth we receive from the rays as the Holy Spirit!

Ok, now to continue with the Works of Mercy, today we will begin the Spiritual Works of Mercy "admonish sinners." This work of mercy – "tough love," you could call it – is one of the hardest to practice in the western world today. Why? Because we live in the "I'm-OK-you're-OK" culture. As such, I have my own personal set of values, and you have your own personal set of values, and we are each free to practice those values to our heart's content just as long as we do not do grievous bodily harm to others in the process (although that limitation is waived when the "others" in question are unborn children, the chronically ill and elderly).

If you really want to be unpopular – indeed, if you really want to risk getting a punch in the nose – try admonishing someone today for, say, swearing in public or wearing provocative clothing or talking loudly in Church or availability of pornography, or try engaging in non-violent protests outside an abortion clinic, or try explaining to a gay friend/relative that his/her lifestyle is unnatural and the he/she will never find true fulfillment, peace, or healing but through Jesus Christ. Nine times out of ten, the end result of these attempts to "admonish sinners," no matter how gently and compassionately they are performed is that one is branded an intolerant bigot. (I know I've been called a "few names" before!) After all, what could be a worse or more politically incorrect attitude in an I'm-OK-you're-OK culture than to tell others, "You're not OK; you're harming yourself and others, at least spiritually and psychologically, if not also physically and sociologically?

The problem is that we live in a society dominated by people who have not made any real psychological or moral progress since they reached adolescence. Thus, they stumble through life with an adolescent understanding of love. They are prime candidates to be manipulated by the evil one. In their minds to be "loved," means to be affirmed in everything they want to do that does not cause anyone else (except unborn children, the chronically ill and elderly) grievous bodily harm. Imagine telling someone like that, "Hey, I think you are doing something wrong; I think what you are doing can lead you to spiritual self- destruction and, perhaps to the spiritual destruction of others, too." They'll likely complain that you are practicing intolerance and bigotry (experience tells me – yep!)

Yet, it is to spiritually adolescent people like this – to a whole society dominated by such people – that we are called to "speak the truth in love," as St. Paul put it (please read Ephesians 4:15), with both courage and compassion. This is not EASY to do. It takes the virtue of prudence as well as finding just the right moment and just the right words and saying them in a way that clearly affirms the human dignity of the person you are speaking with, even as they are challenged to fulfill his/her highest potential. St. Paul pray for us!!

Ecological Virtue 4- Justice

As children, we live in that existential "me" world where we cry (literally!) for justice for ourselves- my things, my food, my time with Mom/Dad. As mature Catholics, we became aware of the slate of Catholic Social Teachings that encourage us to work for justice for all God's children- those we encounter and those across the globe. And more recently, Pope Francis has called us all to "listen to the cry of the poor and the cry of the earth", and work for Justice for all God's creation- "This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her" [LS 2]. The awareness that all creatures and their homes should be treated equitably and with care is a foundation of our ecological conversion, our choices. "A change in lifestyle could bring healthy pressure to bear on those who wield political, economic and social power. This is what consumer movements accomplish by boycotting certain products. They prove successful in changing the way businesses operate, forcing them to consider their environmental footprint" [LS 206].
