

19TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Today's liturgy is a word of encouragement for the church. It reminds us that no matter what seems to threaten our safety, we can rely on the presence of Christ to uphold us. We are reminded as well that our response is an act of faith.

All of the prayers of the liturgy are an affirmation of our faith in the God who sustains us and who gives us the grace to live the life of faith. We ask to be given an increase of Christ's Spirit so we can share our eternal destiny with Christ in glory.

860 years before Christ, Elijah challenged all the prophets of Baal to a contest on Mt. Carmel which ended in Elijah's victory and the annihilation of all the pagan prophets. This context proved that Israel's God was the true God. Jezebel was furious and vowed blood vengeance on Elijah. To save his life, Elijah fled from Israel to Mt. Horeb in Sinai, the very same place where Moses gave Israel the Ten Commandments and where God made a covenant with Israel. There Elijah heard God's voice, not in dramatic natural phenomena, but in the silence of his heart. Elijah went out and followed the Lord's instruction to continue his ministry and to appoint Elisha as his successor. God's saving mission would thus be accomplished and the faithful remnant would listen to the prophets.

Paul's sadness that so many of his faithful Israelites rejected Christ is evident in chapters nine through eleven of his letter to the Romans. They were the chosen ones – the ones who should have been first in line to receive the blessings of the new covenant. In these chapters also, Paul contrasts the acceptance of Christ by the Gentiles with the Jew's rejection of him. Paul was not accusing his fellow Jews, nor was he speaking to them as if they were outsiders. Rather, he wanted to teach his brother and sister Israelites the truth of what God was doing in Christ. They were after all, the first heirs of the promise.

Just prior to the event in today's gospel, Jesus had performed the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. One would think that the disciples, having just seen this demonstration of Jesus' power, would have been confident that Jesus surely could save them from the fury of the storm. Like the disciples, we, too. tend to forget or misunderstand the significance of Jesus' work in our lives.

In this incident, Peter's faith was both tested and strengthened; he experienced the trials and growth of a true disciple of Christ. By stepping out of the boat at the Lord's invitation, Peter demonstrated at least some degree of realization that Jesus was the Messiah.

Day after day we are confronted with situations that put our faith in the Son of God to the test. Perhaps there has been a sudden death in the family, an unexpected financial burden, or some other crisis in the family that seems too hard to bear. At times like these, our faith may falter; we can doubt that God cares for us or even that he exists. Yet, it is in this very situation that our faith can be strengthened by calling out to Jesus.



CATECHISM CORNER

Good and blessed Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time! I was looking at the readings for today's Mass and it occurred to me that the visuals of mountains, wind, fire and water are mentioned a great deal in the Bible. It could be as a place, a reference to God or many different reasons. Today's Gospel about Peter walking on the water is one of my favorites! I so love St. Peter and his enthusiasm!

Here's a little tidbit: "seas" are mentioned in the Bible more than 450 times! The lakes and seas are: Mediterranean, Lake Hula (a little north of the Sea of Galilee, and not very big when compared to the others mentioned), Sea of Galilee, and the Dead Sea. From page 476 in the *Word and Worship Workbook Year A:* "The Sea of Galilee is known for its violent storms. It is 696 feet below the Mediterranean Sea. It is about thirteen miles long and eight miles wide and its maximum depth is about 200 feet. The weather of the area is subtropical and the surrounding towering hills promote rapid changing wind currents. In the summer months when the sun warms the lake, the wind, mixed with the warm water of the lake, can cause extreme sudden and severe storms." Interesting, don't you think AND it explains some of the scripture referencing the volatility of the Sea of Galilee!

The seas were very important for people who lived when Jesus walked the earth. The Sea of Galilee was a major source of food and water for the people living in the region. Fishing was a major industry in the area and many of Jesus' disciples were fishermen. The Sea of Galilee was also an important trade route for goods being transported between Egypt and Syria. The Mediterranean Sea was also important for trade and commerce during this time period. Many of the cities along the coast were major ports for ships traveling throughout the Mediterranean region. I find it interesting that Jesus called Peter on the shores of the Sea of Galilee! And here we are again with Jesus and Peter as the main "characters" in today's Gospel! St. Peter had a gregarious personality and was a natural leader and spokesperson for the apostles. Of course, his wishy/washy behavior when Jesus was being incarcerated and interrogated could be like us today. Meaning we are all supportive and enthusiastic about our Catholic Faith when life is going nice and easy, but the moment we are persecuted or ridiculed for being Catholic...do we act like St. Peter: deny Christ (our Catholic Faith), are anxious and frightened when approached to explain something about our Catholic Faith from someone of another religion?

This is where knowing, truly knowing your Catholic Faith is very important. The parish has provided and offered many different reading and listening materials about several topics of the Catholic Church. I greatly encourage you to take one AND read/listen (to) it. Also, there has been talk about having some Adult Catechism. What do you think? Let me know at jdewtn2018@att.net.

To finish with this Corner, please reflect on this statement: the foundation of this Church will not be toppled by the power of evil or the power of death. Trouble will come, the boat will be tossed about the torrents of life, but nothing will permanently destroy the Church. Jesus' resurrection protects the Church from destruction.
