20TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Today's liturgy is an invitation for us to reflect on the universal mission of the church. Such a reflection is rooted not only in our experience of God's people, in the witness of the gospel, and in the celebration of the liturgy, but also in the teachings of the Church. The message of universality that resonates throughout today's liturgy is better expressed in today's Alternative Opening prayer. We pray to the Father whose "care extends beyond the borders of race and nation to the hearts of all who live." We ask that the walls of prejudice come crashing down in the midst of the shadow of God's outstretched arms.

Our liturgy demands that we extend the love we share in the celebration of Eucharist to all the world. Christian faith without tolerance is not faith at all; it is self-righteous arrogance.

Today's first reading from the third chapter of Isaiah speaks of Israel as an open and missionary community. Non-Israelites can now become part of the people of God! The prophet makes it abundantly clear, that such membership involves commitments. These individuals of foreign descent must observe the Sabbath and hold fast to the covenant. Ministering to the God of Israel, loving his name, and being his servant spell out the implications of membership in the Israelite community.

In the second reading, Paul emerges as one who took membership in the Christian community very seriously. He gloried in his ministry, but it was a ministry that radiated Christ to both Jews and Gentiles. He experienced the Lord's mercy on his way to Damascus, and thereby he became all the more anxious to exhibit that mercy to the world. He had received an irrevocable call and, therefore, could not desist from communicating God's gift of life to others.

In the Gospel, Matthew presents the Canaanite woman as the embodiment of Christian membership. Though belonging to two minorities (she not only was a Gentile but also a Gentile woman), she dared to seek Jesus out. When others tried to rebuff her, she persisted. This is a unique story. The only part of this story that most people remember is Jesus telling to her "it is not right to take the food of the children (the Jews) and throw it to the dogs (meaning Gentiles)." A dog would be an unclean animal for the Jews, just as Gentiles were considered unclean by the Jews. A more accurate translation for the word "dog" used in this gospel is "puppies". No matter how offensive that could be, the important thing to notice is that the woman didn't turn and walk away in a huff. She was humble enough and clever enough and persistent enough to accept Jesus' remark and turn it into her advantage in order to gain his help to heal her daughter. Jesus had insisted on other occasions in the importance of perseverance in prayer and not giving up. The woman in the gospel wouldn't give up. The story shows that although Jesus' mission was not to the Gentiles before he was crucified, he was not opposed to their having full share in God's love and blessings. So, every Sunday, as we do today, we come together to hear about Jesus and to celebrate the love God has for us and for all people.

CATECHISM CORNER

Good and happy Sunday St. Francis of Assisi! We've "talked" about saints a couple of times in depth here in the Corner. So, what do you know about our patron saint, St. Francis of Assisi? My knowledge, I thought, was fair, but once I started looking, my "knowledge" paled to the actual life of this saint.

What did St. Francis really look like? He was a scrawny and plain looking man. He wore a filthy tunic, with a piece of rope as a belt and no shoes. While preaching (sometimes to just the birds/animals!), he often would dance, weep, make animal sounds, strip to his underwear (this is where the society of nudists say that St. Francis was a nudist! Something I DIDN'T know!), or play the zither; which is a musical instrument consisting of a flat wooden sound box with numerus strings stretched across it, placed horizontally, and played with the fingers and a pick. His black eyes would sparkle as he did this!

Some facts:

- He was an Italian friar who lived in Italy in the 13th century. He lived a life of ascetic (the practice characterized of severe self-discipline and abstention from all forms of indulgence) poverty and was dedicated to Christian charity.
- He was born to a wealthy cloth merchant. St. Francis lived in wealth and ease until God used a meeting with a leper to change his heart. What happened when St. Francis met a leper? St. Francis had a fear and disgust of lepers. One day, however, he met a man afflicted with leprosy while riding his horse near Assisi. Though the sight of the leper filled him with horror and disgust, Francis got off his horse and kissed the leper. Then the leper put out his hand, hoping to receive something. Out of compassion, Francis gave money to the leper. But when Francis mounted his horse again and looked all around, he could not see the leper anywhere. It dawned on him that it was Jesus who he had just kissed. In embracing the leper, St. Francis experienced a singular moment of grace. That act of mercy should encourage us all.
- He is one of the most venerated religious figures in Roman Catholic history.
- He is known for his ministry to the poor and underprivileged, his care for nature and animals, and founding of the Franciscan order.
- He composed the prayer for the Stations of the Cross: We adore You O Christ and we praise You.

What did St. Francis suffer from? The summer of 1224 Francis went to the mountain retreat of La Verna (Alvernia), not far from Assisi. He stayed there for 40 days to pray how best to please God. As he prayed the Gospels for the answer, he came upon references to the Passion of Christ three times. On the feast of the Exaltation of the Cross, he saw a figure coming toward him from the heavens. When the vision disappeared, it left not only a greater passion of love in Francis, but marked him with the stigmata (marks resembling the wounds on the crucified body of Jesus Christ). For the remainder of his life, Francis took the greatest care to hide the stigmata. Francis lived two years longer, in constant pain and almost totally blind. He had contracted an eye disease while evangelizing in the East in 1219. Medical treatment was unsuccessful and after a stay in Siena, he was brought back to Assisi where he died at the Porziuncola. Interesting, after the death of Francis, Brother Elias announced the stigmata to the order. Later, Brother Leo, the confessor and intimate companion of the saint who also left a written testimony of the event, said that in death Francis seemed like one just taken down from the cross!

Why is St. Francis holding a skull in some art pieces? The inclusion of the skull was popular in Counter-Reformation art, as a reminder of man's mortality, a memento mori emblem – "Remember you must die" – emphasizing Heaven, Hell and the salvation of the soul in the afterlife.
