PASTOR'S NOTES

22ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Last Sunday we heard Jesus granting Peter a special place among the apostles because of his confession that Jesus is the Messiah and Son of the living God. Traditionally the Messiah was to be in the same model as the great King David, a strong victorious warrior. The Messiah would defeat Israel's enemies and restore the land to its rightful owners.

Jesus shocked his disciples when he told them that he must suffer and die in Jerusalem. They simply could not conceive that God would abandon his servant – the one whom Peter had just proclaimed "the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). It made no sense! Yet, when Peter tried to dissuade him, Jesus rebuked him sharply: "Get behind me Satan! You are a hindrance to me; for you are not on the side of God but of men" (16:23).

Peter was by no means the first (or the last) person who struggled to understand the mind of God. We all tend to view things in human terms. When God called Jeremiah, in today's first reading, to warn the Israelites about their imminent chastisement, the religious leaders rejected and even physically abused the prophet (Jeremiah 20:1-2). In his confusion, Jeremiah confessed his bitterness: "O Lord, you deceived me, and I was deceived.... I have become a laughing-stock all the day" (20:7).

The call to discipleship – which both Peter and Jeremiah experienced – is a privilege and a challenge. The privilege rests in the disciple's close relationship with a loving God. At the last supper, Jesus told his followers: "No longer do I call you servants... But I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you" (John 15:15). Imagine the special favor of being known as a friend of God, the grace of learning what is in Jesus' heart as he reveals to you his Father's perfect plan and intention. What could be a greater honor!

The challenge comes as we travel the road that leads to such a relationship with God. Many times a disciple's limited human wisdom will be confronted by the mystery of divine wisdom. God wants to expand our vision and give us a broader view of the way he works, and this expansion can sometimes be painful. Yet, as a child sometimes struggles to learn the wiser path from its parents, so too a disciple will gain wisdom as he or she allows God to form a new heart within.

Despite their initial inability to grasp God's ways, both Jeremiah and Peter persisted in obedience. In the end, they became shining beacons reflecting the glory of their beloved Master – the joy and strength God gave them – the intimate knowledge of his love – more than compensated for the cost of discipleship.

By allowing God to work in our hearts, we, too, can open a pathway for God to form us as disciples – beloved friends of Jesus Christ.

CATECHISM CORNER

Happy Sunday, St. Francis of Assisi! Have you noticed the two saint statues on the wall in the small alcove? One of those is St. Clare. I've often wondered about St. Clare....who she is...how did she become a saint....why is she associated with St. Francis.....Well, I'm going to try to answer my questions and hopefully answer any you have of this most wonderful saint!

St. Clare of Assisi was born in Assisi on July 16, 1194, as Chiara Offreduccio, the beautiful eldest daughter of a wealthy representative of an ancient Roman family, Favorino Sciffi, Count of Sasso-Rosso and his wife Ortolana who was a very devout woman belonging to the noble family of Fiumi. As a young girl, Clare dedicated herself to prayer. At 18-years-old, she heard St. Francis of Assisi preach during a Lenten service in the church of San Giorgio and asked him to help her live according to the Gospel. On Palm Sunday in 1212, Clare left her father's home and went to the chapel of the Porziuncula to meet with Francis. There, Clare's hair was cut off and she was given a plain robe and veil in exchange for her rich gown. Clare joined the convent of the Benedictine nuns of San Paulo, near Bastia, under Francis' orders. When her father found her and attempted to force her back into his home, she refused and professed that she would have no other husband than Jesus Christ. In order to give her the greater solitude she desired, Francis sent Clare to Sant' Angelo in Panzo, another Benedictine nun's monastery. Clare's sister Catarina, who took the name Agnes, joined her at this monastery (I bet their father wasn't happy about that!). The two remained there until a separate dwelling was built for them next to the church of San Damiano.

Overtime, other women joined them wanting to live a simple life of austerity, seclusion from the world, and poverty, according to a Rule which Francis gave them as a Second Order. St. Clare and her sisters wore no shoes, ate no meat, lived in a poor house, and kept silent most of the time. They became known as the "Poor Ladies of San Damiano." Their lives consisted of manual labor and prayer, yet, they were very happy because the Lord was close to them all the time. For a brief period of time, the order was directed by St. Francis himself and by 1216, Clare became the abbess of San Damiano. While serving as the leader of her order, Clare defended them from attempts to impose a rule on them that more closely followed the Rule of Saint Benedict than Francis. Clare was so devoted and dedicated to Francis that she was often referred to as "alter Franciscus," or another Francis. She encouraged and aided the man she saw as a spiritual father figure, and took care of him as he grew old. Following Francis' death, Clare continued to promote her order, fighting off every attempt from each pope trying to impose a rule on her order that would water down their "radical commitment to corporate poverty."

In 1224, an army of rough soldiers came to attack Assisi. Although very sick, Clare went out to meet them with the Blessed Sacrament on her hands and had the Blessed Sacrament placed at the wall where the enemies could see it. This is why she is portrayed with a Monstrance in her hands. Then, on her knees, she begged God to save the Sisters. In that moment, a sudden fright struck the attackers and they fled as fast as they could without harming anyone in Assisi. On August 9, 1253, Pope Innocent IV declared Clare's rule would serve as the governing rule for Clare's Order of Poor Ladies. Two days later, Clare died at 59-years-old. Ten years after Clare's death, the order became known as the Order of Saint Clare. In 1255, Pope Alexander IV canonized Clare as Saint Clare of Assisi. (catholicsaints.com)

During St. Clare's sickness, she suffered great pains for many years, but she expressed that no pain could trouble her. St. Clare was designated the patron saint of television in 1958 by Pope Pius XII, because when St. Clare was very ill, she could not attend mass and was reportedly able to see and hear it on the wall in her room. She is also the patroness of eye disease, goldsmiths, and laundry. St. Clare's feast day is celebrated on August 11. **OH NO! I've run out of room!** Have a grace filled week!
