#### **27TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

The parable in today's gospel is a trilogy, a play in three acts, a drama that stretches back to the time of Abraham and Moses and forward into eternity. As followers of Christ, we play an important role in that great drama.

Here is the synopsis of the first two acts of this three-act play. Act one is set in ancient Israel. As the scenes unfold, we see God establishing a radically new relationship of love

with the people of Israel-- a covenant of love, first with Noah, then with Abraham, and finally through Moses, a covenant with the people of Israel. It is a covenant wherein God says to the people of Israel: I will make with you a covenant that no other people can claim. I will be your God and you will be my people. Within that covenant, God's love would be constant, and the people would flourish in a land flowing with milk and honey, a land as rich and fruitful as the vineyard in the parable.

But we know what happened. The people forgot the covenant; they turned away from God and substituted foreign gods, idols; they neglected the poor and the stranger. To bring them back, God sent the prophets to warn them, to control them, even to threaten them. God sent the prophets, like the servants in the parable, to collect what was rightfully due to the Divine Landowner--the return of love from those who were the beneficiaries of love. But the prophets, like the servants, were uniformly rejected and mistreated. Jeremiah was even thrown into a dry well. Although they spoke for God, each of the Servant Prophets experienced rejection.

The second act of this play is also familiar to us. In this act, it is Jesus who is sent to the people of Israel to receive what is rightfully owing to God--the love of God's people. Everything Jesus did in His public ministry, the preaching, the miracles, the healing, all was intended to win back the love of the foolish tenants. But we know what happened. We know how the second act ends: Once again, the servant, who was God Incarnate, was rejected like the servants who went before him. Not only rejected; this Suffering Servant was betrayed, tortured, and killed. As the curtain falls on the second act, picture the Cross dominating the scene.

Now we come to the third act. Again, it is servants who play the leading role. But in this act, it is not the prophets of old who have the main role. It is you and me. We are now the servants sent by God to deliver to the Divine landlord, all the love, the devotion, the commitment that is owing. Each of us here today, Priest, Deacon, religious, layperson, each of us is a ministering servant. And I suppose at times we feel as rejected as the servants in the final act. The people we are sent to minister, do not appreciate us. We find ourselves unable to awaken in the tenants that excitement about God we had hoped to find when we first became servants.

How then do we reveal that it is Christ the servant acting in and through us? We do it by supporting one another. No servant can minister well alone. We need the support of other servants. We need the support of this community as it celebrates the Eucharist; we need the support of small Christian communities; we need the support of our families, strengthened by prayer, by scripture study, by retreats. Without that ongoing support, people will not recognize Jesus the servant in us.

My friends, we have an important role to play as servants. Let us pray that we will play our parts well.

#### **CATECHISM CORNER**

Happy 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time! Today, we will be "discussing" the Fourth Commandment which is "Honor your father and your mother." Next to God, those most deserving of honor and love are our parents; for next to God, no one else is more responsible for our life and knowledge of God than our parents. God creates; parents procreate.

This commandment obliges us to respect and obey our parents, or those who take the place of parents in our lives. It is God's will that, after Him, our honor is owed to our parents. The commandment appears often in the Bible and involves four key actions: appreciate them, respect them, obey them, and care for them. (I understand not all people have had a positive/good relationship with their parents. Some have experienced physical abuse, emotional abuse or verbal abuse and for this the Church – which is you and I – is extremely sorry.) The CCC 2198 states "This commandment is expressed in positive terms of duties to be fulfilled. It introduces the subsequent commandments which are concerned with particular respect for life, marriage, earthly goods, and speech. It constitutes one of the foundations of the social doctrine of the Church." The CCC paragraph 2217 further explains: As long as a child lives at home with his parents, the child should obey his parents in all that they ask of him when it is for his good or that of the family . . . But if a child is convinced in conscience that it would be morally wrong to obey a particular order, he must not do so. Obedience toward parents ceases with the emancipation of the children; not so respect, which is always owed to them.

Like the Third Commandment, regarding keeping holy the Lord's day, this commandment is also disguised in positive terms, and not in the negative terms of "Thou shalt not....." God made us to image Himself. God is a Trinity: a community of loving Persons. And for this reason, the father must be love – a provider and protector, like God the Father. The mother must radiate love in the family, like God the Holy Spirit in the Trinity. And the children should reflect the obedience of the Son of God to Mary and Joseph. This states that God meant for us to live in community. The family is the oldest institution in the world, established by God Himself in the Garden of Eden and preexists both Church and State. The State which exist, among other reasons, to support and strengthen marriage and the family. And when I write this, I mean that, the State should protect: the right to have a family and adequate means to support it; the right to bring up children in accordance with the family's own traditions and religious and cultural values; and the right to housing suitable for proper family life.

The family is the very basic building block of society......and, in my opinion, all you have to do is watch the "Nightly News." It is discouraging, but not inevitable because the future of society is intimately bound up with the vitality of the family institution. St. John Paul the Great said, "Nothing that directly compromises the family can benefit society. On the other hand, every policy that promotes the family furthers social life." To further explain: the Christian family constitutes a domestic church, for it is a place where faith, prayer, and love should bind its members together: A strong family leads to a healthy society and vigorous nation; and a holy family leads to a prosperous local and universal Church. I wish our state and national leaders would read my corner!

Please reflect on these words of St. Mother Teresa: "It is easy to love the people far away. It is not always east to love those close to us. Bring love into your home, for this is where our love for each other must start." And she also said, "If you want to bring happiness to the whole world, go home and love your family." Have a most wonderful week!

It has been several years since we've printed any information regarding our beautiful Columbarium which was installed in October 2019. There are a total of 96 niches in the Columbarium, each of which will hold two urns. To date, half of the niches have been sold.

The cost of a niche is currently \$2,500 which includes the two urns and a bronze nameplate. Cremation and interment service is not included in that fee. #### PONTIFICAL COLLECTION FOR WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

A second collection will be taken up on October 21 & 22 for World Mission Sunday. By baptism, all Catholics are called to participate in the mission of the Church and to share their faith as missionaries of the Gospel. This collection supports the pastoral and evangelizing programs and needs of nearly 1200 mission dioceses in Africa, Asia, the Pacific Islands, and remote regions of Latin America. Funds are distributed in the Holy Father's name by the Society for the Propagation of the Faith—a Pontifical Mission Society. Pope Pius XI first instituted Mission Sunday for the whole Church with the first worldwide collection in 1927 in order to help emphasize our catholicity and universal solidarity in sharing in our common responsibility for evangelizing the world.
