### 31ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



The readings of today's liturgy are an extended meditation of what it means to be a Christian leader. I am reminded immediately of my old hometown pastor. Contrary to the Pharisees, he was a model of Christian leadership. If the gospel calls us to model our own Christian service after the witness of good and sound example, I feel very confident in modeling my own ministry after the example he provided. He was not perfect, and I have not placed him on a pedestal. However, I admired him because he was a man of

prayer and action. He was objective, fair, and honest in his dealings with people. He was quick to forgive and every person received equal treatment from him.

He, like Paul, was extremely pastoral and allowed love to guide his counsel, rather than rigid adherence to the law. He was approachable and very understanding. He challenged people when necessary and was quick to offer compassion. He was not threatened by the giftedness of those around him – he empowered and celebrated it. He acknowledged his own mistakes and had an uncanny ability to put himself in other peoples' shoes – even people who disagreed with him and caused him annoyance. He was not showy or pretentious. I felt honored to have him as pastor and call him friend.

I am also reminded of the natural leaders of our parish who live the word of God in their everyday lives. No one ever named them leaders; they simply are leaders. They have earned the title through the witness of their lives. When certain ones of them speak, everyone listens, including me. They speak with authority and authenticity. Their credentials are their humility and their self-sacrificing love. There are at least five people who come to my mind. I have learned more from them about Christian leadership than I have from all my experiences of church. They put the imperatives of today's gospel into recognizable action. The best Christian witness is a well-lived life.

Jesus' words remind us that even when we are doing his work, we must be careful that we serve by washing the feet of others – not by asking others to wash our feet. The "greatest" of those in positions that involve leadership and visibility – must possess the largest heart, a servant's heart. Their motivation for serving must be love for others, not to bring glory to themselves.

When we serve others, letting go of our need to feel important or valued, we imitate our Lord Jesus. He who was truly the greatest among us was also a servant who washed the feet of his disciples.

When we find ourselves consumed by prideful attitudes, we need to repent and ask the Lord to help us serve as he served. The more we become aware of our prideful tendencies, the more we can rise above them, with God's grace.

# The Eighth Commandment

"You Shall Not Bear False Witness Against Your Neighbor"

#### **CATECHISM CORNER**

Today's Corner focus is on the Eighth Commandment "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor." The CCC 2464 states: "The eighth commandment forbids misrepresenting the truth in our relations with others........" Simply put: lying. And lying is contrary to the nature of God, who is Truth. St. Augustine

provides a saintly witness that lying is always morally wrong, regardless of the circumstances. Always tell the truth, no matter the cost. So, that little "white lie" – wrong!

Words are the bridges between people. Lies rot the bridges and isolate man/woman. Lies destroy society and intercommunication, for you can't trust a liar. Think about this: the lie of Satan robbed us of the earthly paradise! The CCC in paragraph 2482 states: "A lie consists in speaking a falsehood with the intention of deceiving." The Lord denounces lying as the work of the devil: "You are of your father the devil,... there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks according to his own nature, for he is a liar and the father of lies."

The definition in the Catechism has the virtue of anchoring a lie in objective reality. To be properly termed a lie, a statement must fulfill two conditions: (a) It must be objectively false; (b) It must be spoken with the intention to deceive. This is the BRUTAL truth! With the advent of the different social media platforms, "experts" state that lies spread like wildfire on social media, getting quicker and longer-lasting pickup than the truth. This is a very sad state of our society. With that being said, please reflect on this small excerpt from the booklet: The Ten Commandments of God by Rev. Albert Joseph Mary Shamon: (FYI – this could also be a man!) "A malicious gossip came to Confession to St. Philip Neri. Before giving her absolution, Philip gave her as a penance to take a pillow of feathers to the wind. After doing that, the woman came back for her absolution. Philip said, "You've done only half your penance; now go and collect the feathers you scattered." She protested that she should not do this. "So," said Philip, "it is equally impossible to undo the damage your lying tongue has caused." Like I said earlier, brutal truth!

Not sure where I found this, but I carry "it" to remind me Who I belong to and I'd like to share "it":

Words can bring laughter. Words can be powerful. Words can bring tears. Words can be strong. Words can create enemies. Words can tear apart.

Words can take away fears.

Words can help them belong.

Words can help you feel warm.

Words can be kind.

Words can make you feel cold.

Words can silence you. You are a word, Words can open your mind. the Word of the Lord.

I always told my students to be kind with their words and that being two-faced never doubled anybody's face value! So, as you reflect on the above "poem", please also reflect on this scripture passage from Sirach 28:12 "The tongue can build up or destroy."

St. Philip Neri, pray for us! Please have a wonderful week and remember to pray for peace in the Middle East.


