#### 33RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Today is the thirty-third Sunday of Ordinary time. Next Sunday we conclude the Liturgical year with the Solemnity of Christ the King of the Universe.

Both of our readings from Proverbs and Paul's letter to the Thessalonians are good reminders of our duties. Proverbs describe a woman with generous behavior who works hard and reaches out to help others. The example is a woman, but her example

is for all of us. Paul praises the Thessalonians, reminding them that they are children of light and children of the day. Then he cautions them not to fall asleep but to stay awake and be sober, so they are not taken by surprise when the day of the Lord comes.

The God of Jesus loves freely but also makes demands. Our gospel reading makes this clear. Jesus shares the parable of the talents. Before leaving, a master distributes talents to his servants. While the master is gone, some of his servants take risks and are able to multiply their talents. Think of the man going on a journey as Jesus, and the workers as his disciples. Jesus has given them the Good News to spread throughout the world. We are those disciples with the Good News, and we are to share the Good News with others. This gospel challenges us to step out in faith and to share the gifts that God has given us in order to multiply the fruit. How are we doing? Think about yourself and how you have been doing the work of a disciple of Jesus. Would there be a reward for you? Would you be cast out?

The ones we need to learn from are the servants who doubled what they have been given. The servant who buried away what he was given is the wrong one to follow. He pretends to be in good terms with his owners but does not do his duty. He is like the person today that believes that the life of faith has nothing to do with anyone else but only with God. Faith is not private; it has to be lived and seen. You can think of persons, both from the past and in the present, who have lived their life in amazing faith, reaching out to others with generosity, love, and true concern. St. Francis of Assisi comes to mind, as does Mother Teresa of Kolkata.

They have lived their faith in the sight of the world. They show us how we are to live, even if our lives are not as dramatic as theirs. Gustavo Gutiérrez, a contemporary theologian from Perú, says it so well: "Faith is life which is expressed in love and gift to our neighbor." In the gospels, being afraid is equivalent to having no faith....The parable of the talents teaches us that the joy of the Lord, as well as our own joy, consists in a Christian life lived on grace, courage, and concern for others rather of formality, self-protection, and fear."

Faith in our Lord will not disappoint, but it will not bring payoffs every time we pray or do something good. If that were to happen, faith would be unnecessary. The reason we need faith is because we are not always immediately blessed for some good thing we do. The kingdom of heaven will be greater than anything we can imagine and will far outweigh any good thing we are able to do, but we have to wait for it with faith and hope.

Today, let us ask for the Spirit of God to help us to live with the same grace, courage, and concern for others so that we can be worthy disciples of Christ. May this Spirit inflame our hearts, enabling us to respond in love and gratitude.

#### CATECHISM CORNER

Good morning, St. Francis! We have arrived at the Tenth Commandment – "You shall not covet your neighbor's goods." We already know what covet means and you would think this is an easy one because we've explained the definition. Well, it's not! Specifically, the Tenth Commandment forbids the capital sin of "avarice", also known as greed or covetousness. Avarice refers to an excessive desire, or inordinate love, for wealth, status and power. It is characterized by a willingness to make the accumulation of these things the center of our lives, the purpose for which we alone live. I've always said that wealth (money) is not bad, but the love of money is evil. St. Paul states it in clear words in his letters, please read 1 Timothy 6:10 and Hebrews 13:5.

Poison is all right in the bottle, but don't let it get into the bloodstream. Money, too, is all right, but don't let it get into your blood! As you read the following statements, followed up with the Scripture, please take a moment to reflect.

- For money, Judas sold Jesus (Matthew 16:15).
- For money, soldiers lied about the Resurrection of Jesus (Matthew 28:13).
- For money, Ananias and Sapphira lied to the apostles and died on the spot (Act s 5:1-11).
- Money is behind abortions, drug pushing, pornography and trafficking.
- Jesus likened riches to thorns that can choke out the wheat of virtue (Matthew 13:7).
- Money has enriched thousands but has damned tens of thousands.

Money may be the key to everything but Heaven; it may provide everything but true happiness. Often in seeking everything that money can buy, we lose everything that money cannot buy. It is vital and our responsibility, therefore, to cultivate two virtues:

First, **detachment**. Blessed are the poor in spirit; not the poor, but the poor in spirit: those detached from wealth. I know you've heard this before, but I think it serves repeating: There are no U-hauls behind hearses. Here and now is not a lasting city. This world is a motel, not our home. Use it, but remember we pass on. To drive this fact home Jesus told the Parable of the Rich Fool. Please read Luke 12:16-21.

Second, **generosity**. It is in giving that we receive from Luke 6:38 and St. Francis highlighted that too in his famous prayer! Please read Jesus' Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus from Luke 16:19-31.

The Tenth Commandment says, "Be content." Discontentment comes from envy, being unhappy about the good fortune of another as though it were a reflection on you; and covetousness, always wanting what you don't have. St. Augustine said that the human heart is triangular, and the world is round: it cannot fill the corners of the heart – only the triune God can. So, Augustine confessed: "our hearts, therefore, are restless until they rest in Thee." (One of my favorite quotes from one of my favorite saints!)

The following is something that Reverend Albert Joseph Mary Shamon, while on a plane, shared in his booklet *The Ten Commandments of God* and was used at my previous parish for middle and high school students. I would like to share it with you: "When Nelson Rockefeller died, the headline in the paper read: "Rockefeller leaves 70 million." That morning I happened to be flying from the Caribbean to the States. A Chicago businessman sat next to me on the plane. He almost became ecstatic with the headline. "Think of it, Father," he said to me, "he left 70 million. What an achievement!" I simply said, "He left it. What about his immortal soul?"" A good question Father Albert, a good question for all of us.


#### **ANGEL GIVING TREE 2023**
