# DEACON'S NOTES

### FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

In our Gospel reading today, Luke presents Mary as first a prophet. We think of Mary, not as outspoken and bold for justice, but as quiet and passive. Yet in the Canticle of Mary (Lk. 1:46-55) she sings a song of praise to God who shakes up the status quo, who lifts up the humble like her, and chooses her, rather than a high-born woman, to be bearer of God's Son. She foreshadows her son's ministry that will likewise lift up the lowly.

If we have trouble seeing gentle Mary meek and mild as a prophet, we need to remind ourselves that her call mirrors those of the Old Testament prophets. Her call to be a prophet follows the Old Testament's four-part pattern of prophetic commissioning: call, objection, God's ignoring of the objection, and God's final assurance that God is committed to the prophet and his mission.

# 1) The Call of God

First comes the call of God to the prophet. Isaiah and Ezekiel saw visions: Isaiah of a great heavenly gathering, Ezekiel of a cloud and four winged creatures. Jeremiah heard only a word, Elijah a still, small voice in the silence of his heart. In Mary's case, God sent the angel Gabriel to confront her. Then God tells the prophet that he has been chosen and what he is to do. God told Jeremiah, "I have appointed you to be a prophet to the nations."

The angel says to Mary: "And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus . . ."

#### 2) Objection to the Call

The prophet objects to the commission by protesting his inadequacy or pointing to some factor that makes it impossible. Jeremiah said, "Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." Moses protested that he wasn't a good public speaker.

Mary said, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?"

# 3) God Ignores the Objection

In the entire Bible, God never listens to someone's objection and says, "You're right. You've convinced me that you're not as qualified as I thought. I'll keep looking." The prophets were not chosen because they were ready to be chosen, because they felt confident in their abilities, and it was a good time for them to clear their calendars of other commitments so they could be prophets. They were called when God was ready to call them.

# 4) God's Reassurance of Commitment to the Prophet

God reassures the prophet that the divine presence will abide with him in carrying out the call. The prophet's job description is not to speak out of his own wisdom or eloquence, but to be a messenger for God, to do and speak what is commanded. In fulfilling this task, God promises to be with the prophet as deliverer.

#### **CATECHISM CORNER**

To my Dear Parish Family,

"And in the end, everything else will turn out to be unimportant and inessential, except for this: Father, Child, and **LOVE**." St. (Pope) John Paul II.

Yes, for some of you this might be the end of Advent, but to me it is the beginning of a wonderful celebration. The birth of Jesus. The fourth candle of Advent represents **LOVE** or the Angel's Candle. The color again is purple leading us to anticipate the new Kingdom of God on earth. How appropriate this candle is also known as the Angel's Candle. Some of our favorite hymns during Christmas are "Angels We Have Heard on High", "While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks by Night" a phrase in the song reads, (The Angel of the Lord came down), or how about "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing". The Angels are the celestial beings that first announced the birth of our Savior, and they did so with much LOVE.

Without **LOVE** there is no **JOY**, there is no **PEACE** and there is no **HOPE**. I would like you to go back and reflect on all the Advent candles. Let us all welcome Jesus with great **LOVE** this Christmas.

And on Christmas Eve and all of Christmas week we will add another candle to our Advent Wreath, it is a white candle that is placed in the middle of the wreath, brighter and bigger to remind us that Jesus, the true light is born.

I hope all of you enjoyed these little tidbits about the Advent Wreath, it brought joy to my heart, and writing these last four weeks gave me such peace while researching. All of these writings were written with much love.

#### **CHRISTMAS**

DEACON'S NOTES

One December, in the year 1223, Francis of Assisi had travelled to the little village of Greccio to pray. High up in the mountain, Francis had a hermit's cave. How Francis loved the quiet spot. He could be alone with God.

Toward evening, Francis heard music being played in the village below. Villagers sang joy filled old songs; Christmas was just around the corner. The Son of God, Jesus,

would soon return to Earth, a baby, little and poor, to be held in the arms of Mary, his mother. The songs sang of this great event, the birth of Christ.

So full of joy himself, Francis had an idea. He wanted to do something to recall to memory the little child who was born in Bethlehem. To let people see with their own eyes how Jesus lay in a manger with cows and donkeys standing near, the baby lying upon the hay where he had been placed.

Living in Greccio was a good friend of Francis, Giovanni Vellita. Giovanni was a very holy and good man, a knight, a man of some wealth. Francis told Giovanni his idea for a Christmas creche, and Giovanni loved the idea so much that he promised to help build this living nativity scene.

The work began on a level piece of ground, near the hermit's cave where Francis had come to pray. Franciscan brothers and people from the village pitched in to help.

A manger was placed in the middle. A manger is another name for an animal's feed trough. Hay was put into the trough, as it would be for the animals to eat. Cows and donkeys were placed around the manger. Horses and mules were brought close by. Surrounding this manger, just as in Bethlehem, was to be a stable, a barn, where animals were kept.

At last, everything was ready. The creche at Greccio looked like a new Bethlehem. The baby Jesus would be placed in the manger at Midnight Mass. Francis was very happy.

Francis stood beside the crib, his heart overflowing with tender compassion. Overcome with joy, tears flowed down his cheeks. His friend Giovanni saw a beautiful child asleep in the crib and saw his friend reach and take the child in his arms. The baby Jesus roused himself, as a child does from a deep sleep. Giovanni saw it. Everyone could feel it, the child Jesus, long forgotten by many, now so close to the hearts of all at that special midnight Mass. When mass ended, everyone returned home feeling holy joy.

What a beautiful story. How powerful this story is. But that is how the tradition of the Christmas creche began. A tradition that carries on 800 years later. Many of you have nativity scenes in your homes, in your yards, just about every church in town displays a manger scene. We have one right outside the church there. And I suspect when you leave you'll find Jesus lying in the manger.

Francis also gave us a challenge: to prepare a crib in our hearts, ready to welcome the Christ child into our lives. Each of us is to give birth to Christ by how we live our lives. We are to empty our hearts of anger or hatred and live by faith, hope, and love. We are to obey God's commandments; we are to love our neighbors as ourselves. We are to sow love, we are to bring hope and light, and we are to sow joy. Each of us is to open a door in our hearts and let the Christ child come in.

#### **EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS PILGRIMAGE**

Join other pilgrims from the Diocese of Knoxville on a pilgrimage to the 2024 National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis July 17-24, 2024.

The diocesan pilgrimage will include round trip transportation, a four-night hotel stay, and admission for all Eucharistic Congress events, speakers, and the closing Mass. There is also a "tickets only" option, which excludes transportation and lodging. Buses will depart from Knoxville on July 17, 2024 and return on July, 21, 2024.

The pricing ranges from \$541-\$1,098 per pilgrim, depending on the occupancy of the room. This includes 4 night hotel accommodations and admission to all events and speakers.
