PASTOR'S NOTES

FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

Today we begin a new year in our religion life and our worship. We start preparing for our Lord's birthday. But we prepare for more than that. We prepare for all his comings.

Even unbelievers have begun searching for the best Christmas gifts for their loved ones. We, for our part, have to remember the most loved one, our Lord Jesus Christ. What is the choicest gift for him? Needless to think about it; He gave us himself, and he wants from us our very selves. Advent is the time of preparing our gift of self to Christ. Our prep-

aration involves looking back, looking to the present, and looking forward. Today's readings help us to do it.

In the reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, the people of God are pleading to God to come to their aid. They are back from exile. They thought it would be all roses at home in Israel. But in fact things are a mess. They felt dirty by their sins, shamed by their betrayals, and justly abandoned to their troubles. They are lonely for God and his help. They call to God to come as their Lord and Savior.

By the time of the second reading, several years later, their cry had been answered. God the son has torn open heavens and come down in the Incarnation. The Virgin Mary had conceived, Christ had been born on the first Christmas, and his resurrection had taken place. The first Christians had been called, and we are hearing from them through St. Paul.

Paul's point is: Do not settle for what Christ has already done. Look forward for his return. Keep serving with your wonderful gifts so you will be free of blame and eager for his second coming. In Mark's Gospel, our Lord's parable tells us the kind of waiting we must do. His parable applies both to his coming to call us individually, and to his coming to call home the whole human race.

Our Advent worship of waiting, then, is really a waiting for all the comings of the Lord into our lives. We meditate on his past comings; we alert ourselves to his daily comings into our lives; we look to the celebration of his birthday; and we prepare for his final coming and our going home to him.

The Advent waiting is really a special waiting, is an active waiting. It's not like waiting for your ride to come church or to go buy groceries. It is a waiting of preparation, a waiting by doing, a waiting for making every-thing ready for the Master's return.

The parable is a guide for the Advent waiting. Our waiting is not passive but active. This waiting is sometimes a painful waiting. As we saw in the first reading, things were not going right. The people were suffering. As Jesus told us, we too will suffer. Our waiting is also progressive. Unlike the people of Old, we don't have to wait until Jesus' Incarnation and resurrection. Furthermore, Jesus keeps coming in many ways. He visits us through life's events, through prayer, and through sacrament. At this Mass, he will rend the heavens and come down to us. But we must be alert, or we won't recognize these comings. Advent is meant to make us more sensitive to the many ways the Lord keeps coming into our lives.

This waiting is communicative. We do not wait as though God is far away like a bus out of sight. By prayer we talk to God already present, and beg him to become more present. We wait to be fully with him as love desires. This waiting is also penitential. We search our lives for the obstacles to his coming, find them, and remove them. We correct what is wrong, stir sorrow for our sins, and confess them. We pray more, go to Mass more, we do whatever we can do to intensify our love life with God.

As we begin a new liturgical year, we might ask ourselves, are we any better prepared to meet him today than we were a year ago? If we backtracked or just stayed in the same place spiritually, we need to hear Jesus once again tell us "stay awake, be alert."

CATECHISM CORNER

Blessed First Sunday of Advent and Happy New (Church) Year dear parishioners of St. Francis of Assisi. As we begin this new Church year, we also begin a new cycle of the lectionary for our Scripture. We are now in Cycle B. This is the second time I have been asked to write the Catechism Corner. My reflections will be on the Advent Wreath, one candle per week. Each candle deserves its own corner, I **hope** I do this season justice.

Before we discuss the first candle, let me remind you of the meaning of the Advent Wreath itself. The circular shape of the wreath symbolizes God's infinite love for us, the evergreens used to make the wreath symbolize life and growth, and green is the color of **hope**. Are you seeing a pattern with the word **hope**?

Why the first candle of Advent is important is because it serves as a new beginning. Advent which is taken from the Latin word Adventus means arrival. The candle represents **HOPE** or the Prophecy Candle. The first candle takes us back to Isaiah's foretelling of the birth of Christ and all the promises made in the Old Testament. We read, pray and reflect on the **hope** God's plan gives us, fulfilled by the life and death of Christ and the promise of Christ's return. It is fitting that the color of the candle is purple, the primary color of Advent and a color that symbolizes royalty.

In the words of Pope Francis: "Advent is a journey towards Bethlehem. May we let ourselves be drawn by The Light of God made man".

Have a wonderful first week of Advent, next week we will enjoy learning about the second candle of Advent **PEACE**.
