God Alone Remains: The Story of Jonah



An old fisherman found himself at the pearly gates of heaven and was greeted by St. Peter. "Friend," said Peter, "what are you doing here?"

"I want to get in," said the fisherman. "I want to enter heaven."

"I'm sorry," said St. Peter, "but you can't come in. You've simply told too many lies during your life."

This caused the fisherman to fall on his knees and plead, "Have a heart Peter. Remember you were a fisherman once yourself."

Fishermen and fish stories are notorious for exaggeration. Fish stories often disregard the truth. This, however, is not the case in the Book of Jonah, which is perhaps the most famous fish story of all time. Today's first reading is from the Book of Jonah. It is the only time that the Book of Jonah appears in the Sunday lectionary, and we are at a great disadvantage because we have only a piece of this story. If we were to understand the message of the Book of Jonah, we would not find an exaggeration or a lie. We would discover an astounding revelation, and startling truth concerning God's mercy.

In order to really understand what this story of Jonah is about; we need to know who the Ninevites were. Nineveh was the capital of the ancient empire of Assyria, and the Assyrians were the most violent and feared people in the ancient world. They were always seeking to extend their empire and they did so by whatever means available. They were violent and ruthless. The Assyrians destroyed the northern kingdom of Israel and almost captured Jerusalem. Therefore, all the people of the ancient world, but particularly the Jews, hated the Assyrians. So did Jonah. So when God asked Jonah to go and preach in Nineveh, Jonah did not want to go. Jonah was afraid that his preaching might be the very excuse that God needed to forgive and show mercy to the Assyrians. Jonah did not want that to happen. He did not want his enemies to receive God's mercy. Therefore, when God asks Jonah to go to Nineveh, he runs away. This is recounted in the first part of the Book of Jonah. Jonah books passage on a ship to Tarshish, trying to run away from God's command. This is where the fish comes in. God sends a storm, Jonah ends up in the water, and the fish comes and swallows him.

So far from telling us a lie, this remarkable fish story from the Hebrew Bible reveals something true about our God. It tells us how God is always above any of the divisions or conflicts that divide us. It tells us why God always prefers peace to war, life to death, mercy over vengeance. Now I know that we live in a complicated world. I believe that we must take steps to protect ourselves from those who would harm us. But as our country seeks a way to do this, we as believers must remember where our God stands. Jesus knew the message of the Book of Jonah. For Jesus said, "Blessed are the merciful for they will obtain mercy. Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called children of God." Those are words by which we are called to live.



Happy Third Sunday in Ordinary Time St. Francis! This Corner's Beatitude is Blessed are they who mourn; for they will be comforted. Jesus says in this Beatitude from Matthew 5:4 that those who mourn are blessed, and they will be comforted. While we normally interpret those who mourn as those who are "crying" over various things that cause them grief, such as the loss of a loved one, mourning in this passage does not mean the same thing.

Rather, the way Jesus uses the word "mourn" is in the way of people mourning over their own sins. Therefore, when the Lord says, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted" (Matthew 5:4), he is referring to those who mourn over their own sin, for they will be comforted.

When we mourn over our sins, it brings our hearts to repentance (Sacrament of Confession). This is why the Lord says we will be comforted when we mourn because God will forgive us our sins and give us comfort in our hearts. If we mourn over our sin, it demonstrates the truth that we see sin the same way God sees it — completely wicked, vile, and evil. I know those are some harsh words, but sin is just that – wicked, vile and evil.

Since we have established the meaning of mourning in reference to Matthew 5:4, we have also to understand what "blessed" means in this context. Often, we don't think of people being blessed if they are in mourning; however, since we know the proper definition of mourning in the context of Matthew 5:4, it helps shine a light on the meaning of "blessed" in this passage also.

When the Lord tells us we are blessed if we mourn, He is telling us that we are indeed blessed if we mourn over our sins because it shows we are seeing sins the same way He sees sin. By feeling guilt and mourning over our sins, it shows that we are having great Christian growth and that the Holy Spirit is working in our hearts, thus causing us to turn away from sin. Therefore, those who mourn can be full of joy because our deep mourning and sorrow will lead us to repentance (the Sacrament of Confession), lead us to the mercy of God, and causes us to follow after the leading of the Holy Spirit. Anything that causes us to follow after God and to pursue His heart brings joy to God.

Blessed often is connected with happiness or joy, and through the beatitudes, including the beatitude of "blessed are those who mourn," the Lord teaches us that lasting happiness and joy cannot be found apart from Him.

This may read as a little confusing, so I would like to summarize by this statement (It helped me!): The Lord tells us that those who mourn will be comforted. God Himself comforts us and gives us the peace that only He can provide. When we mourn and acknowledge our sins before God, He is faithful, and He will comfort our hearts. I will say how comforting this Beatitude is once I knew the true meaning of Matthew 5:4!

As you reflect on this Corner, please also reflect on the part of our Mass and we acknowledge our sins which begins the Penitential Rite, and we say the Confiteor (Latin for I confess). This is followed by the Kyrie, where we ask for God's mercy. We do this at **every** Mass. To me, this is very comforting. Peace to you, St. Francis.
