#### CAPERNAUM



We've been focusing a lot on Capernaum lately in the Gospel readings. Capernaum was a very important place. It was Jesus' home after He left Nazareth. I have never been to the Holy Land. It's on my bucket list. If I do go though, I will certainly visit Capernaum.

It is said that a pilgrimage to Israel is like the Fifth Gospel because after such a pilgrimage we read the Sacred Scriptures with a new understanding having been in the

places associated with Jesus and mentioned in the Gospels. One of the places a pilgrimage to Israel visits is the location of the synagogue in Capernaum where Jesus exorcised the man in today's Gospel (Mark 1:21-28). Also, in that synagogue Jesus preached his sermon on the Bread of Life in John 6 which will be our Sunday Gospel for a number of Sundays this summer (18<sup>th</sup> – 21<sup>st</sup> Sundays in Ordinary Time Year B). Another place to visit in Capernaum is the house where Peter lived since Jesus lodged with Peter in Capernaum which will feature in our Gospel next Sunday (Mark 1:29-39). Because of his fishing business, Peter had moved to Capernaum as it was on the northern shore of the large lake called the Sea of Galilee. A church with a glass floor now stands over the location of Peter's house where Jesus used to stay so you can look right down into that area.


Jesus came to Capernaum after he had a confrontation in his synagogue in Nazareth, his boyhood home. Since he was rejected in Nazareth, Jesus Christ decided to relocate his ministry to Capernaum. It was an ideal spot for Jesus to deliver his messianic message; it was a larger town than Nazareth and was on the main Damascus Highway. As a result, Jesus was able to reach out to more people. It was also a safe distance from Tiberias and the dangers of Herod. Soon after Jesus settled there, he began to preach in the synagogue. The town was soon referred to as "his own city." (Mt 9:1)

The bible also mentioned Jesus as staying in the house of Peter, who lived in Capernaum. Here, Jesus is known to have healed the fever of Simon's mother-in-law as well as a Roman Centurion's servant.

There are detailed descriptions of the area from the first century thanks to the writings of the historian Josephus. Josephus was taken to Capernaum after he was wounded in a battle near Bethsaida. His writings on Capernaum speak about an area with fertile springs. Yet today, springs are only to be found in Tabgha, 3 miles west of Capernaum. To this day, there is a dispute about whether Tabgha is the original site of Capernaum.

There is also evidence that Judeo-Christians lived in the Jewish community of Capernaum in the late Roman period. Since Capernaum decided not to participate in the Jewish revolts against the Romans in the first and second centuries, it was spared and remained unscathed for centuries. According to archaeologists, the city thrived throughout the Hellenistic and Roman periods but was abandoned in the seventh century CE after the Islamic invasion.

Christian pilgrims today will see archaeological excavations that have uncovered an original city of about 1500 inhabitants. Several sanctuaries have been excavated, testifying that the location was at one time venerated. And evidence at the site indicates that an earlier house was transformed into a church. This church, we believe, was built on the house of the apostle Peter. (www.biblestudytools.com)



Good Sunday St. Francis of Assisi! Today, the Beatitude we will be reflecting on is Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land. The land that is referred to in this passage is the earth itself.

The Meaning of "Blessed Are the Meek": Meekness is humility. And in the case of Christianity, it describes how we are to depend on God rather than ourselves or the world. In Matthew 5:5, Jesus referred to Psalm 37:11, which says, "But the meek will inherit the land and enjoy peace and prosperity."

We might have a different idea of meekness in our culture than in Jesus' day. Let's "talk" about this word! Meek isn't a common word we use to describe someone. A deeper look at its true meaning explains why such a characteristic is a rare commodity. To be meek is to be kind and gentle, submissive or compliant, tame, and humbly patient or docile. God sees every part of our hearts, and His truth serves as a necessary guidepost to ensure we are living the way He has called us to live – the way just described.

To be meek is to be gentle, lowly, humble. Humble people show gentleness and patience toward others. Truly meek or humble people do not throw their weight around. They are gentle, but with firm faith. They are peaceable without being compromising. The meek/humble can restrain their anger; they can be tolerant. They are not prideful, overbearing or haughty. But they are not wimps, or spiritless or overly submissive. Yet they will go the extra mile, turn the other cheek. "The meek are the 'gentle'... those who do not assert themselves over others in order to further their own agendas in their own strength, but who will nonetheless inherit the earth because they trust in God to direct the outcome of events. People who are humble/meek know that everything and everyone is a gift from God, and a sign that He is always with us, therefore reach out to others.

Another way to think about this beatitude of "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land" is that you're blessed when you are content with just who you are—no more, no less. That's the moment you find yourself a proud owner of everything that can't be bought. It's interesting to note that the translators interpreted meekness to mean accepting the gifts God has given to us! We embrace who God created us to be and His distinct purpose for our lives.

Most of those who receive blessings would've been the least of these in Jesus' culture, and the meek stand at no exception. With an oppressor like Rome at the heels of the Israelites, they wanted to do the opposite of gentleness. They wanted to rebel, to crush Rome. And they thought Jesus would be the man for the job. Which brings up to what this verse does NOT mean?

(Christians can often misinterpret this along with the "turn the other cheek" verse we find in the same sermon series.) Meekness does not mean remaining quiet when we see injustices take place in the world around us or simply sitting back and taking abuse in our families, in our church, and in our world.

Meekness here means a number of things:

- NON-RETALIATION: In Jesus' culture, they operated in an eye-for-an-eye mindset. If someone were to wrong you, you'd wrong them back. The problem was retaliation escalated in a never-ending cycle. Here, Jesus calls us to diffuse the fire before it grows too dangerous.
- THANKFULNESS: We ought to be thankful for the gifts God has given us. A worldly leader wants more and more and is envious of the gifts others have that he cannot possess. A godly leader is content with the gifts God has given him and chooses to honor God with them.
- Joy: No matter how dire the circumstances, a meek person will find joy in knowing the heavenly Father has a plan for his life.

Thank you for reading today's Corner. Please reflect on and pray about the following statement during your Sunday: Meekness doesn't appear to have a high place in our society. Meekness, defined here by a gentleness or the state of not being provoked easily by an enemy or oppressor, has virtually no place in a revenge-based world that we live in.
