THE HEALING PRESENCE OF JESUS



Today's gospel from Mark gives an account of Jesus' ministry of healing. When Jesus is curing diseases and casting our demons, it is obvious that he has the gift of performing miracles, a gift that can only come from God. If you are not paying enough attention, you could almost miss all the things Jesus does in this gospel reading today. First, he cures Simon's mother-in-law. He then cures others of illness and casts out demons.

He next heads to a deserted place to pray while crowds try to find him. He then goes to nearby villages to preach in synagogues and drive out more demons. The demons know who he really is, the Son of God, the divine Messiah. If he is proclaimed as Messiah when he is performing miracles, the hearers will assume that he is a miracle-worker.

However, miracle-worker is only a part of the story. For Jesus to be Messiah ultimately means betrayal, suffering and death. The Scripture readings today give us a reality check. Our gospel shows how Jesus knew the reality of his life that included rejection, suffering, and death as well as glory and divine power.

The reality of life that our readings today teach us is the experience of each of us in the human family. We all have good days and bad days, successes and failures, times of joy and times of sorrow. For some the sorrow seems never-ending and life looks absolutely hopeless. The only real help we have in avoiding despair is our Christian faith. Because of the salvation we have in Christ, we know evil will not triumph at the end.

From the beginning, the Church has had a sacrament to pray for the sick but in later centuries it was used only to prepare people for death. The sacrament is based on the words of St. James in his epistle—when someone is sick they should call for the priests of the church and be anointed with oil. Gratefully, Vatican II restored it to its original purpose of praying for healing. It is still given when a person is near death because it is also a source of spiritual healing, grace, and peace.

The victory of Easter has to go through the events of Good Friday. Jesus embraced the human experience from birth to death. He gave us a powerful example. He knew the reality of our lives and showed us how to move in and through our days with faith and gratitude.

The gospel of Mark reminds us that genuine actions are always going to speak louder than bold and fancy language. Those who met Jesus were healed by him, and those who heard his words knew the champion was in their presence. They knew their lives would be forever changed by their encounter with Jesus. Mark just does not waste time telling you about it. What a precious message our Lord gives us today.





Hello and blessed Sunday St. Francis friends. Today in the Catechism Corner, we will concentrate on the Beatitude of "Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied."

Right away people may think about physical hunger and thirst, but when Jesus adds "for righteousness" it has an entirely different meaning!


In this verse, Jesus is referring to a spiritual hunger and thirst: a runaway impulse towards righteousness. In other words, having a desire so intense that if you do not fulfill it, something in you will die. St Jerome says our "Lord is asking us not simply to have a vague desire for righteousness: we should hunger and thirst for it, that is, we should love and strive earnestly to seek what makes a man righteous in God's eyes. A person who genuinely wants to attain Christian holiness should love the means which the Church, the universal vehicle of salvation, offers all men and teaches them to use — frequent use of the sacraments, an intimate relationship with God in prayer, a valiant effort to meet one's social, professional and family responsibilities."

Many people are hungry and sometimes our hunger can be misguided. Some people hunger for prestige, power, fame, status, recognition, affection, etc., but they are looking to quench their hunger in the wrong places. Righteousness, in the language of the Bible, is the same as what nowadays is usually called "holiness". Here are some Scripture passages that will help you understand:

- 1 Jn 2:29; 3:7-10;
- Rev 22:11;
- Gen 15:6:
- Deuteronomy 9:4

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that the Beatitudes are at the heart of Jesus' preaching and fulfill the promises made to the chosen people since Abraham. The Beatitudes depict the countenance of Jesus Christ and portray his charity. They express the vocation of the faithful associated with the glory of his Passion and Resurrection; they shed light on the actions and attitudes characteristic of the Christian life; they are the paradoxical promises that sustain hope in the midst of tribulations; they proclaim the blessings and rewards already secured, however dimly, for Christ's disciples; they have begun in the lives of the Virgin Mary and all the saints. So, regarding the specific beatitude "Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied," the Catechism of the Catholic Church explains that those who have entered into Christ will suffer a great deal of hunger and thirst, because there is so much injustice around us. The more intense your love, the more intense your hunger and thirst; blessed are you if you live with this kind of hunger and thirst, because that means you have entered into the hunger and thirst of Christ. FEAST OF ST. BLAISE, BISHOP AND MARTYR FEBRUARY 3RD

St Blaise was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia who was martyred in the year 316 AD. The oldest accounts tell us that Blaise was a physician at Sebaste before he was made bishop. In the 4th century persecution of Licinius, St. Blaise was taken prisoner. After suffering various forms of torture he was beheaded.

The most popular story attributed to St. Blaise occurred while he was in prison, when he cured a young a boy who was in danger of choking to death because of a fishbone in his throat. That story, and the fact that St.

Blaise was a doctor, made the saint very popular for intercessory prayer for throat ailments.

At an early date, the veneration of this Eastern saint was brought into Europe, and Blaise became one of the most popular saints of the Middle Ages. Countless churches and altars have been dedicated to him.

The blessing of St. Blaise will be offered after Masses this weekend.

The blessing of the throat is carried out using two white taper candles that were blessed on the previous day, February 2, the Presentation of the Lord (Candlemas Day). The white color of the candles symbolizes purity. A red ribbon draped over the base of the candles symbolizes the martyrdom of St. Blaise. The candles are grasped in an X-shape and held up to the throat of the person receiving the blessing:

"Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."
