LAETARE SUNDAY

Here in the U.S. Mass is said in English. If you go to a foreign country, you will hear a Mass said in the language of that particular country. Mass used to be said in Latin all over the world. That is because Latin was and still is the official language of the Roman Catholic Church. Every now and then you will hear a word or phrase in Latin during mass. The Fourth Sunday of Lent is known as Laetare Sunday. Laetare is the Latin word for "Rejoice."

This term is not exclusive to Catholics. Many protestant churches celebrate Laetare Sunday as well. While the season of Lent is a solemn and reflective season, the church recognizes that people need a break from all this sorrow.

This past Thursday of the third week of Lent marked the halfway point of the Lenten season. As such, we use Laetare Sunday as a day of celebration to "lighten the mood" so to speak.

The Phrase "Laetare Jerusalem" comes from Isaiah 66:10-11: "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exalt and be satisfied at her consoling breast." This is the entrance antiphon from today's Mass. On Laetare Sunday, the purple vestments and altar cloths of Lent are set aside, and rose ones are used instead. Flowers, which are normally forbidden during Lent, may be placed on the altar.

The season of Advent in preparing for Christmas and the birth of the Christ Child also has a similar celebration. This takes place on Gaudate Sunday or the third Sunday of Advent. The reason for these two days is to give us hope as we move towards the end of each penitential season. It is almost as if we have crested a hill and can see our final destination. That is the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus.

Welcome to the Fifth Sunday of Lent St. Francis! The Doctors of the Church, especially St. Augustine and St. Thomas Aquinas, explained the "beatitudes" with which the Savior begins his Sermon on the Mount in great and profound detail. There is no room to go over their whole teaching here. Suffice it to say that the Lord begins his teaching with the ultimate goal of the Christian life: a holiness that leads to eternal happiness or beatitude. Today we will focus on the last beatitude, which is a summary of the other seven. "Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you

and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

But the patient undergoing of persecution and trial is the summary of them all. This is simply because if we are able to stand up under trial and misunderstanding and persecution, we will surely observe all the other beatitudes, rejecting a false happiness and embracing the goods of the active life and the final heavenly life. How can I endure persecution and so enjoy the reward of perseverance? Our "persecution" today will be more likely sarcastic remarks about being a "religious nut" or if we make a stand for life and against abortion we are called "fanatics". Courageous people of all ages suffer ridicule simply for being chaste, believing in abstinence before marriage or standing up for justice and equality and the values of Christ many in the world do not accept.

Persecution takes on different forms. First of all, even if we are not being visibly or socially persecuted by other human beings, we are all pursued and tried by the efforts of the evil one. Temptation is a form of persecution by the evil one, and so it is that we pray in the Lord's Prayer, "And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the Evil One" as the original Greek of the Gospels has it.

None of the saints made their way to heaven by following the Savior without being instructed and equipped and strengthened by God's word. How can we endure persecution and so enjoy the reward of perseverance? How can we become saints today? Well, let's start by taking out our Bible and reading it, examining the readings that the Church offers us each day for our defense and instruction in a world of very bad news. Faithfully meditating on the word of God found in the scriptures equips us for this struggle, since God's word is, as the apostle tells us, a "two-edged sword" that can defend us from the attacks of evil men and of the devil who instigates their attempts to separate us from the way of Christ Jesus.

In summary, the first seven teach us what actions, under the influence of the virtues and gifts of the Holy Spirit, merit an eternal reward. The first three merit eternal life by overcoming a false kind of happiness found in possessions and worldly power, or in pleasures, or in the assertion of one's own grumpy will; the fourth and fifth by engaging in the active life of acquiring virtue and doing good to one's neighbor; and the sixth and seventh in the contemplative life of knowledge of God and inner and outer peace of soul. Each happy-making action has its corresponding reward.

Please reflect on this quote by St. Mother Teresa which relates to this Beatitude: "One cannot expect to become a saint without paying the price, and the price is much renunciation, much temptation, much struggle and persecution, and all sorts of sacrifices. One cannot love God except at the cost of oneself."

Here is this week's "advice" to help you with your three disciplines of Lent: FAST from watching any television today. PRAY for the souls of friends and loved ones who have died. GIVE (almsgiving) by putting someone else's needs before your own today.



LECTIO DIVINA DURING LENT

The St. Francis Council of Catholic Women (CCW) will again offer the ancient practice of "Lectio Divina", or the reading and contemplation of sacred scripture. The sessions will be offered every Tuesday in Shea Hall immediately following morning Mass (at about 9:15 am) and will last approximately 45 minutes. The session will consist of a reading of the chosen Gospel, followed by 10 minutes of private contemplation, then group interaction as to how or why this reading affects you and/or what it was trying to tell us. You are invited to bring your Bible or any other material to aid in the discussion.




