The joke is that whenever the church gives away free stuff, we draw large crowds at those particular Masses. So, on Ash Wednesday, we have a big crowd for Mass. And today, Palm Sunday usually draws a big crowd as well.

People love palms. People put the palms we take home today behind the crucifix or holy picture in their home for the year or weave them into smaller crosses to wear during this day. They remind us of what happened on Palm Sunday.

Palms were leaves of triumph, much like flags people wave today when a head of state visits. They didn't have flags in those days, but people waved palms to honor Jesus as he came toward Jerusalem after raising Lazarus. We all know those same people would turn on Him a few days later in His Passion. So, the palms remind us of three truths:

First, they remind us of human unfaithfulness, how quickly today's hero can be tomorrow's villain or today's idol can be next year's forgotten person. Today's acclaim can become next month's ridicule. If we live our lives dependent on human acclaim and popular opinion, we are building on the wind. The palms remind us of that.

Secondly, the palms place us within the Passion account. The characters of the Passion are not creatures from outer space. They are us. Through our reading of the Passion, we can identify with Peter's denial, with Judas' betrayal, with the disciples' flight, with Pilate's cowardice, with the leaders' cynicism or with the crowd's mindless frenzy. We all have a place in the Passion story. The palms remind us of that as well.

Thirdly, the palms remind us of Christ's love. Despite what all these people did to Him, Jesus died for all of them. His love, His truth, His forgiveness, His grace are the foundations on which we can rely. Despite our failures, in Him we can have a new and strong life. The palms remind us of that as well.

Take the palms home today and keep them. They remind us of our human tendency to blow both hot and cold both then and now, of our own sins and failures and of Christ's redeeming and victorious love which alone can make us whole and strong.


As we begin Holy Week, I hope you will all avail yourselves to the different liturgies that will take place this week. We may not be giving away any free stuff, but the days of Holy Thursday and Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil, are just as important, even more so, than Ash Wednesday or Palm Sunday.

The Chrism Mass will take place on Monday March 25, 2024, at the Cathedral of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus in Knoxville. Services at St. Francis of Assisi in Townsend are as follows:

DEACON'S



Here we are at Palm Sunday! The Church celebrates this Paschal mystery – the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ – annually during Holy Week. This most holy week begins with Palm (or Passion) Sunday.

During this coming Holy Week, we will celebrate in our Church calendar year what is called the Triduum (**Trid** • yoo • uhm). And what exactly is the Triduum? The word Triduum has Latin roots, meaning **"the three days**." The Triduum is a season separating the

Lenten and Resurrection seasons and spans three days - the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and concludes after the evening prayer on Easter Sunday. Sometimes, people use the word in other contexts, but most of the time it refers to the Paschal (Easter) Triduum. The Triduum is the highest point of the entire liturgical year!

Last year I talked briefly about each day of the Triduum, but this year I would like to reflect on the three disciplines that we all tried to concentrate on during the Lenten Season – I know, I tried, but it is difficult! I've "talked" about the three pillars/disciplines of Lent: almsgiving, prayer and fasting. So, how did you do?

With almsgiving, I hope we reflected on making the needs of others our own, especially the needy of our world or the sick and the suffering right here in our parish and town through the St. Vincent dePaul Society, or our families and friends in need, or how about that next-door neighbor(s) in need? Did you take a "Rice Bowl" home with you and contribute?

Reflecting on **prayer**, this Lenten time offered us all a very special opportunity to grow in our relationship with God and to deepen our commitment to a way of life, rooted in our baptism. Did you attend the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent and attend the simple suppers? Did you take one or all of the material(s) offered to help you reflect on your prayer life? Did you attend Lectio Divino? Did you attend the new Adult Catechesis?

And your **fasting**..... did you smile and go about your day happy? Did you think about what you chose to "give up"? Do you think God needs the chocolate, candy, and other trivial things that we fast from? No, He needs us to look deep within ourselves and reflect. He wants our hearts. I believe He wants us to stop our obsession with the ME and start thinking about what truly matters in life – our relationship with Him – a deeper and a closer relationship/communion with Him!

And now, that 4^{th} (fourth) discipline Father has talked about in the past. I call it the CPR of our lives. C- confession; P- penance; and R- reconciliation. We are so blessed that Father receives penitents before the weekend Masses or any time by appointment – all you need to do is call the office, He (Christ) is waiting!

Lent is a journey, and with the Church's advice/help of almsgiving, prayer, fasting and the "CPR" of our spiritual life, I hope that we find ourselves somewhere different than where we started. I hope that your Lenten journey gave you some time of quiet and prayer, a time of penance and meditation, a time to become aware of our strengths and weaknesses and we can say, now, that we have the "attitude of gratitude." (Quoted from a very good friend of our family – Father Guy Fenger- God rest his soul.) So, instead of priding ourselves on how "well" we observed the Lenten practices – we are invited to focus our gaze on keeping the suffering of Christ ever before our eyes in the person of the poor, the sick, the imprisoned and the dying.

Have a most beautiful Triduum filled with many blessings!

St. Francis of Assisi 2024 Easter Triduum Services March 28, 29, and 30 One liturgy celebrated over the period of 3 days



The Easter Triduum (pronounced **Trid •** yoo • uhm) services at St. Francis of Assisi Church are three of the most moving, reverent, and spiritually rewarding services in the entire Liturgical Year. If you have never attended an Easter Triduum service here at St. Francis, you owe it to yourself and your family to attend the Triduum services. Come be a part of your St. Francis parish family this Holy Week and share in the Easter Triduum experience on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil—one liturgy celebrated over the period of 3 days.

HOLY THURSDAY, MARCH 28TH AT 7:00 PM: The Mass of the Lord's Supper begins at 7:00 PM by gathering in reverent silence. This very special Mass includes a foot washing service wherein we are reminded of Jesus bending down to wash the feet of his disciples. At the end of communion the Eucharist is transferred, in procession, to Shea Hall where it will be available for adoration until 10:00 PM. Please come and worship as a parish family during this time of adoration.

GOOD FRIDAY, MARCH 29TH AT 3:00 AND 7:00 PM: We gather again on Good Friday in reverent silence at 3:00 PM for Stations of the Cross and then again at 7:00 PM to begin our Good Friday service with the Liturgy of the Word—an interactive Passion reading. The Passion reading is followed by Veneration of the Cross where we are all given the opportunity to approach the cross of Christ and offer our Lenten prayers and petitions. Our Good Friday service concludes with a communion service. After communion, reverent silence will be maintained in the church for at least 30 minutes, after which time the church will be made ready for the Easter Vigil.

EASTER VIGIL, MARCH 30TH AT 8:04 PM: The Easter Vigil service begins at approximately 8:04 PM outside on the lawn (weather permitting) behind the Parish Resource Center with the Service of Light from the new Easter fire. At the conclusion of the Service of Light, we process into the church where we continue our celebration with the renewal of our baptismal promise, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

The first will have reflections on how to live out the practical holiness taught by St. Francis de Sales: Living a Devout Life (in a Crazy World); April 26-28.




