

# PASTOR'S NOTES

#### THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

We all have the tendency to be distracted. When I was attending Business School during the 70's, I was informed that the average American was exposed to between 500 and 1,600 ads a day. In 2023 that number jumped to between 6,000 and 10,000 ads per day, all trying to catch our eye and interest. We lose track of our original intent and go down a wormhole of images and information bombarding us with messages that our lives will be happier and more fulfilled with whatever is being advertised.

But it is not only advertisers and influencers who are aware of our tendency to get sidetracked or lose attention. God is also keenly aware and calls us back time and again to what truly matters. In fact, one of God's primary actions throughout Scriptures is to call us back from distraction.

When we read the passage of Jesus cleansing the temple, we can be distracted by what seems to be a fiery anger released against those who were using the temple for their own purposes. In fact, Jesus was performing a prophetic gesture. Scripture reminds us that we are "the temple of the Holy Spirit" (I Corinthians 6:19) and that we should "cleanse ourselves from every defilement of body and spirit" (2 Corinthians 7:1) In his death and resurrection, Jesus opened the way for our cleansing, and it is Jesus himself who personally accomplishes this in our lives – as we allow him into our hearts.

Our Lent began with God speaking through the prophet Joel: "Return to Me with your whole heart" (Joel 2:1200). God knows that our distractions are linked to our deepest longing for a connection to what is meaningful and holy. Our desire is ultimately for God, but so much in our world tries to substitute the real thing. When we mistake our distractions for true holiness, we begin to believe that the distraction will fulfill us. Some distractions are more dangerous and addictive than others, but all have the ability to become the center of our lives if we allow them.

In today's first reading, Moses gives the Ten Commandments to the Israelites. The Commandments offer a way of life rooted in fidelity to God. This singular focus leads to right relationship with all others, without distortion and distraction. Yet even as Moses is receiving this Law from God, the Israelites are worshiping a golden calf at the base of the holy mountain. Their impatience leads them to stray, but God does not give up. He calls them back again. God knows our impatience, our fixations, and our longing. In the midst of a world competing for our attention, God calls us back.

In today's gospel, Jesus overturns the tables of the money changers. Changing money into temple coin and buying animals for sacrifice was a normal practice that was overseen and encouraged by the religious authorities and understood as an enshrined practice aligned with the worship of God. Jesus has to take extreme action to disrupt this engrained distraction. People are so fixated on turning a profit and following the prescriptions that that they cannot see that all of it is a distraction from what they say they are about: the true worship of God.

On our Lenten Journey, God invites us to recognize our distractions and our holy longing. What enshrined practices in our own lives might be distracting us from what truly matters? What are the tables in our lives that we might think are essential but really need to be overturned? How does God disrupt us every day from the distractions that vie for our attention? God implores us to return to the source of our longing and not settle for any imitation.

In this Sunday's corner we will be "talking" about the "Beatitude of Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God". People who are peacemakers bring peace and reconciliation to everyone, everywhere.

CATECHISM OR N E R Perhaps it is easier to identify "not peace" than to nail down the meaning of "peace." War is not peace; anxiety is not peace; holding grudges is not peace. The list could go on and on. We feel it in our guts when we are not at peace, not at one with the world around us and within us, and not at one with our God. There is a sense of fear or "dis-ease" or even loss. Still, we have not identified peace.

In Hebrew, the original language of most of the Old Testament, the word translated as peace is "shalom" which is complete harmony with people, nature and God. Along with justice and truth, shalom is to be a hallmark of God's people. In these virtues, we find a reflection of the very nature of God. Shalom is wellbeing, tranquility, at-oneness, or wholeness.

Peacemakers are people who bring peace and reconciliation into the lives of others. They treat others fairly. These are people who face head-on the difficulties of building relationships between human beings that are based on God's values, the values God has placed within every human heart. Blessed are the peacemakers—who not only study peace but spread it. When I think of the modern-day peacemakers, I think of my husband Michael's profession. Normally Law Enforcement is called not because of a "joyful" event but for some type of "chaos" in people's lives. They try to decelerate the situation by either their communication skills because words are very powerful or an "alternate way" to solve the problem.

The prophet Isaiah (9:5-6) spoke of a time when the "Prince of Peace" would rule over a vast and forever peaceful domain. As Christians we believe the Prince of Peace was born in a manger, walked the roads and trails of Israel inviting listeners into this peaceable and just kingdom, then was put to death and rose from death to seal this promise. After Jesus' resurrection, He stood in the midst of the disciples and He offered the worshiping community an offering of peace....this extension of peace is important. Peacemakers are not only in the sense of those who heal dissension. Peace is used in a deeper sense, "the peace of God," please refer to Philippians 4:7; "the peace of Christ," please read Colossians 3:15 and Luke 24:35 48.

"Respect for and development of human life require peace. Peace is not merely the absence of war, and it is not limited to maintaining a balance of powers between adversaries. Peace cannot be attained on earth without safeguarding the goods of person, free communication among men, respect for the dignity of persons and peoples, and the assiduous practice of fraternity. Peace is the "the tranquility of order." Peace is the work of justice and the effect of charity. (CCC, 2304, quoting Augustine, City of God, 19, 13, 1: PL 41, 640; see Isaiah 32:17; see Gaudium et Spes. 78)

Here is this week's "advice" to help you with your three disciplines of Lent: FAST from checking your work and personal email today. (If you have to, only do it once). PRAY that God will help you find peace in a stressful situation. GIVE (almsgiving) your free time today to a friend or family member who needs help with something.

Have a most peaceful week St. Francis.

# Funeral Service for Cam King




Our long-time parishioner, Cam King, passed away peacefully on Thursday, February 22. She was truly loved by everyone and will be greatly missed.
