# Happy Easter! He is risen! Alleluia, Alleluia!

Next week, the Second Sunday of Easter, is Divine Mercy Sunday. We will celebrate Divine Mercy Hour at 3 PM on Sunday April 7, 2024, at St. Francis of Assisi, Townsend. On April 30, 2000 when Pope Saint John Paul II canonized Sr. Faustina he designated the first Sunday after Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday. We will pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet, with veneration of the image of Divine Mercy. So, go to your regular weekend Mass then join us at 3PM. All are welcome. Below is an explanation of this great Feast.

Jesus told St. Faustina that this Feast of Mercy would be a very special day when "all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened". (Diary 699) Our Lord made a great promise to all those souls who would go to Confession and then receive Him in Holy Communion on the Feast of Mercy, on the Sunday after Easter, which is now called Divine Mercy Sunday throughout the Catholic Church.

Jesus promised that "The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain the complete forgiveness of sins and punishment." (Diary 699) He went on to say "I want to grant a complete pardon to the souls that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on the Feast of My Mercy." (Diary 1109)

Fr. Antonio will hear confessions from 2-3PM. We will begin the Holy Hour at 3PM with the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. During this hour there will be time for prayer and adoration, immediately followed by a short communion service. (You may receive communion again if you went to Mass earlier in the day.) We want to encourage everyone to take advantage of this incredible promise and the additional Plenary Indulgence on this great Feast of Mercy "Divine Mercy Sunday." We want you to benefit fully from these promises, and we also want you to notify all of your family and friends about them too and urge them to return to the practice of their faith!

The Image of The Divine Mercy, which Our Lord requested to be solemnly blessed and venerated on this day, will be on display in our church. Pope John Paul II said that the image portrays the Risen Jesus Christ bringing Mercy to the whole world. Our Lord said "I want the image to be solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter, and I want it to be venerated publicly so that every soul may know about it. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish". (Diary 341, 48) Please take the time to visit with this Image of The Divine Mercy and venerate Jesus.

Again, please join us at 3 PM at St. Francis of Assisi on Sunday April 7 (Confession from 2-3PM)!

Jesus, Trust in You!

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Jesus Christ is RISEN! Happy Easter! During my time as a Religion Educator, I had students ask the question: "Did the Easter celebration begin as a pagan holiday?" Of course, the answer is a resounding NO, because whatever that time of year meant for ancient pagans, for Christians, Easter is the celebration of Christ's Resurrection. The fact that when it was first celebrated, the feast of the Resurrection coincided with pagan celebrations doesn't mean it was derived from them. The Jewish Passover (on which Christ was crucified) also coincided with such celebrations, yet this didn't mean it was pagan.

So, with this the questions would continue......how about those Easter eggs? The students would ask about colored eggs being used in rituals associated with a pagan god. There are some claims that the original Easter eggs are Pagan symbols from Europe, but there's little evidence to support this. Instead, it seems to be a more middle eastern tradition. Early Christians looked at the connection eggs had to life and decided eggs could be a part of their celebration of Christ's resurrection. In addition, in some areas, eggs were forbidden during Lent; therefore, they were a delicacy at Easter. So, there's nothing wrong with painting or hunting them on Easter—provided the **real** meaning of the day isn't lost. Any peculiarly pagan significance attached to Easter eggs was forgotten centuries ago.

Another question that ALWAYS made me laugh was "Why is the 'Bunny Rabbit' associated with Easter?" There are several reasons for the rabbit, or hare, to be associated with Easter, all of which come through pagan celebrations or beliefs. The most obvious is the hare's fertility. Easter comes during spring and celebrates new life. The Christian meaning of new life through Christ and a general emphasis on new life are different, but the two gradually merged. Any animals – like the hare – that produced many offspring were easy to include. The hare is also an ancient symbol of the moon. The date of Easter depends on the moon. This may have helped the hare to be absorbed into Easter celebrations.

The hare or rabbit's burrow helped the animal's adoption as part of Easter celebrations. Believers saw the rabbit coming out of its underground home as a symbol of Jesus coming out of the tomb. Perhaps this was another case of taking a pre-existing symbol and giving it a Christian meaning.

The Easter hare came to America with German immigrants, and the hare's role passed to the common American rabbit. Originally children made nests for the rabbit in hats, bonnets, or fancy paper boxes, rather than the baskets of today. Once the children finished their nests, they put them in a secluded spot to keep from frightening the shy rabbit. The appealing nests full of colored eggs probably helped the customs to spread.

Of all Easter symbols, the lamb is probably the most strongly Christian. Other than the fact that lambs are young animals born in springtime, it has no strong ties to pagan traditions. The lamb comes from the Jewish Passover, where each family killed a lamb as a sacrifice. When Christ became the Passover Lamb for everyone, the lamb became a symbol for His sacrifice.

Christians celebrate Easter because it commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. This pivotal event stands as the bedrock of Christian belief, embodying the promise of redemption, eternal life, and the triumph of light over darkness. For believers, Easter represents the culmination of God's divine plan for humanity, offering profound hope, forgiveness, and the assurance of salvation through Christ's sacrificial death and glorious resurrection. It serves as a sacred opportunity for spiritual renewal, collective worship, and joyful celebration, inspiring hearts with the enduring message of God's boundless love and grace.

Here's a little tidbit for you: Mother Mary Angelica, died March 27, 2016 - Easter Sunday. Through Mother Mary Angelica's passionate pursuance of spreading Christ's Truth, the Eternal World Television Network (EWTN) grew from that Birmingham garage into a global network. The EWTN has become a 24-hour TV, radio and online network that broadcasts to 264 million households worldwide! WOW!

May God bless you on this resurrection Sunday and always St. Francis!
