WE ARE ALL PROPHETS WITH A MISSION

PASTOR'S NOTES

Today's liturgy teaches us what it means to be sent by God. We know that prophets are people sent by God. Sometimes they predicted the future but most of the time they tried to direct God's people to live by God's commands. Their efforts to do so were not always appreciated.

Today in the first reading we hear from the prophet Amos who lived over 700 years before Christ. At that time in Israel there were people who made a career out of being prophets.

Whether called by God or not, they would speak for God, telling people how to solve their problems, giving them advice, predicting the future, etc., all for an appropriate fee. They told people only the things they would like them to hear to make them happy. As he says in today's first reading, the prophet Amos was not one of these professionals. He was a farmer, but God called him to go to Bethel, a major city of Israel, to confront the people about their sinful lives and to warn them their immoral lives would lead to their destruction. His blunt and honest message did not make people happy, and the high priest there told him to "get out of town." Today's passage prepares the way for the gospel where Jesus sends his apostles out to preach and warns them, they may not always be welcome.

In our gospel reading Jesus sends his disciples out to preach repentance. Jesus prepares his disciples telling them how they must go out to the people. First, they must go two by two. The reason for that is because they are witnessing to what Jesus taught them. For a valid testimony back in Jesus' time, two witnesses were needed. Upon seeing this, the people of the towns and villages would trust them from the start. In addition, Jesus instructed them to go simply: they had nothing and were dependent on the people. They wouldn't always be accepted, they had nothing to fall back on. Still, they went off, preached repentance, chased out demons, and cured many who were sick.

Amos and Jesus' disciples had much in common: they were sent to prophesy to the people of their time. They did as they were told to do. They were traveling missionaries.

We are also sent, and here is the best news of all: God has blessed us in Christ. In love God destined us for adoption to himself through Jesus Christ. This means we belong to God as sons and daughters, and God chose us in Jesus before the foundation of the world. We have heard this many times over the years. Perhaps it struck us as so amazing that it is unbelievable. But it is the truth, and with this gift comes responsibility.

Sometimes we forget that as we go through life, we're just tourists visiting this planet; we're on a long trip but we're not here forever. As St. Paul tells us, our destination, our real home is heaven. We're not going to take anything with us, except our good deeds. How about all the stuff we're dragging with us through life? Is it helping us move forward to our final goal or is it slowing us down, or even worse, is it a distraction that makes us forget where we're going? Sometimes it is the quest for material things that loads us down on this journey; but it can also be other things too. Sports can hold such a priority in people's lives that they never have time to pray or get to church on Sunday or spend quality time with their family. An excessive love for entertainment or always being too busy can do the same thing. Maybe it is a lot of anger and resentment that we keep holding on to, or addictions and bad habits. St. Paul tells us that God chose us before the world began to be holy and blameless in his sight. If we were created to be saints what is getting in our way?

We are sent as Jesus our brother was sent. We are all prophets with a mission. This means we must speak up for others when it would be easier and more comfortable to be quiet. Just remember that we are sent as God's son or daughter. God will never leave you alone.

In this Catechism Corner, I would like to highlight, again, the Apostle Peter. Peter was singled out for the authority when Jesus told the apostles: "Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matt. 16:19). In addition, Peter alone was promised something else: "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven" (Matt. 16:19). Jesus here promises infallible authority

to Peter that would empower him to speak in the place of Christ, or as his vicar on earth. Catholics believe just what the text says. When St. Peter (and his successors) "binds" something on earth, it is "bound" in heaven. That's infallible authority with the power of heaven to back it up!

Peter's prestigious position among the apostles was symbolized at the very beginning of his relationship with Christ. At their first meeting, Christ told Simon that his name would thereafter be Peter, which translates as "Rock" (John 1:42). The startling thing was that - aside from the single time that Abraham is called a "rock" (Hebrew: Tsur; Aramaic: Kepha) in Isaiah 51:1-2 - in the Old Testament only God was called a rock. The word rock was not used as a proper name in the ancient world. If you were to turn to a companion and say, "From now on your name is Asparagus," people would wonder: Why Asparagus? What is the meaning of it? What does it signify?

Indeed, why call Simon the fisherman "Rock"? This is a good question to contemplate! Let's begin with some basic facts about the verse. Please note in Jesus' time on earth, the Greek terms Petros (Peter) and petra (rock) were interchangeable, and the original Aramaic form of Peter's nickname that Jesus probably used (kēphas) means simply 'rock.' Jesus would have vocalized the Aramaic word kēphas twice for both "Peter" and "rock," revealing his intention to use the word as a pun. This shows the human side of Jesus with His humor! To our English eyes, the saying should read, "You are Rock, and on this rock I will build my Church. Think about this: Matthew is trying to preserve Christ's Aramaic pun in his written Greek Gospel. To clarify this point, consider an analogy from World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) and one of its best-known stars: Dwayne Johnson, also known as "The Rock":

The Rock is The Rock of the WWE.

The Rock is the rock of the WWE.

If Matthew used Petros twice, it would look like the first sentence above. To Greek-speaking Christians, it might read: "You are Peter, and on this Peter I will build my Church." Think about how we know that "The Rock" is named after "rocks" (object), but when we see "The Rock," we naturally picture the person as opposed to the object. Having "The Rock" twice makes the first sentense a redundant identity statement and not a pun. To have the Greek form of Peter's name, Petros, also repeated might appear similarly strange in the reader's understanding.

However, the second sentence lends us a different reading. The second "rock" does not repeat the name "The Rock," but allows us to see an aspect of The Rock highlighted: he's of foundational importance to the WWE. It therefore makes perfect sense that the word "rock" would be used both times here but with different distinctions. It makes the pun more obvious.

I hope this helped you understand why Jesus called the Apostle Peter "the Rock". As with all translations, meanings can be lost or confusion can arise!

One Heart Colombia is a 501c3 Non Profit Organization. The Mission Team has been going to Marsella, Colombia in South America, since the summer of 2005. Every year fundraising and donations are obtained for the Mission with all proceeds going toward purchasing food bags for the poorest of the poor in Marsella. This year 250 food bags were purchased. A food bag costs \$35.00, and each food bag feeds a family of 4 for about a month.

The 2024 One Heart Colombia Mission Team consisted of 7 North Americans from Tennessee, plus 20 Colombian Catechists and Volunteers for a total of 27 missionaries.

The Team was able to host a VBS for 150 of the poorest children in the area. The Theme was *God's Love is Healing, Forgiving and Everlasting*. The Bible Stories focused on the Paralytic Man, the Prodigal Son and Jesus' Resurrection.

During the 10 days that the Missionaries were in Marsella, they were able to visit several homes. The team prayed with and for these families, while distributing several rosaries and prayer cards. They were also able to attend Daily Mass with the local Marsella residents to thank God

for the many blessings of being the hands, face, feet and heart of Jesus.

The Mission Team was able to bring *Hope* once again to the small village of Marsella, high in the Andes Mountains of Colombia, South America.
