PERSONAL WITNESS, HONEST CONVERSION AND A PRAYERFUL HEART



Today's Gospel reading recounts the magnificently generous miracle that triggers Jesus' great discourse. All four Gospels retell the story of the multiplication of the loaves and fish. It is an early glimpse of the Eucharist but contains elements that apply to every dimension of our spiritual life. We can examine them through three details from this miracle.

The first detail is found in the contrast between Philip and Andrew. Philip is overwhelmed by the size of the crowd. He imagines that nothing can be done to feed so many people. Andrew meanwhile points to the few loaves and fish a boy in the crowd has and presents them to Jesus.

Like Philip, we can be intimidated by the size of the challenges that face the Church. Some say that the world is too complex, too secular or too closed to the message of the Gospel. It is as though the media has built up an immunity to deep reflection in people today. The media create a world of reactive emotion and temporary excitements. A religion that lives by the media will die by the media.

A second detail is found in the barley loaves that Jesus uses to feed so many people. St. John alone mentions, twice, that the loaves were made of barley, the bread of poor people. We spend a great deal of money on programs of evangelization, spiritual growth and parish renewal. The amount of money spent cannot replace the power of personal witness, honest conversion and a prayerful heart. These cannot be purchased. They cannot be programmed. They cannot be ordered from a company.

A last detail is found in Jesus' instruction to gather the fragments. What is not used today may be used tomorrow. What we give to the Lord is never wasted but is gathered into God's plan. Words we say to another today may have an impact later on. Compassion we show another may emerge from memory like a "flashback" years later. "Recovered memories" can apply to good things as well as bad. Even when our efforts to reach another seem in vain, we never know when those seemingly unused fragments will provide nourishment to another's growth. Much more is stored in memory than we realize.

One message of this mountainside miracle is not only about what Jesus gives us but also about what we give Him. It teaches us to give the Lord what we have. He will work a miracle with it.





Welcome to the Catechism Corner! Today, before we take a look at the Apostle Andrew, I would like to address a question that I received from a parishioner for the Catechism Corner, regarding the Episcopal Ordination of Bishop Beckman: "This is the first time I'm hearing the term "Episcopal" used in the Catholic Church. Can you please expand on this use of this term in Catechism Corner?"

Yes, I would be happy to explain this! Episcopal ordination confers the fullness of the sacrament of Holy Orders. It makes the bishop a legitimate successor of the Apostles and

integrates him into the episcopal college to share with the Pope and the other bishops the care for all the churches. It confers on him the offices of teaching, sanctifying, and ruling. The Sacrament of Holy Orders is made up of three degrees: episcopate (bishop), presbyterate (priests), and the diaconate (deacons). Whenever I have a question, I go to the CCC, so I would encourage you to read paragraphs 874 through 896. GREAT information!

Again, I would like to apologize about going overboard (no pun intended) with "talking" about St. Peter, but there is/was SO much to discuss, read, and research!

The name Andrew is a variant of the Greek name Andreas and means strong, manly, manhood, or valor, and like other Greek names, appears to have been common among the Jews from the second or third century B.C. St. Andrew, the Apostle, son of Jonah (or John) was born in Bethsaida of Galilee. He was the brother of Simon Peter and both were fishermen. At the beginning of our Lord's public life, they all occupied the same house at Capernaum (Mark 1: 21 and 29). From the fourth Gospel we learn that Andrew was a disciple of the Baptist, whose testimony first led him and John the Evangelist to follow Jesus. Andrew at once recognized Jesus as the Messiah. and rushed to introduce Him to his brother. Peter.

On a subsequent occasion, prior to the final call to the apostolate, they were called to a closer companionship, and then they left all things to follow Jesus (Luke 5:11; Matt. 4:19-20; Mark 1: 17-18). Finally, Andrew was chosen to be one of the Twelve; and in the various lists of Apostles given in the New Testament (Matt. 10:2-4; Mark 3:16-19; Luke 6:14-16; Acts 1:13) he is always numbered among the first four. The only other explicit reference to him in the Synoptists occurs in Mark 8: 3, where we are told he joined with Peter, James, and John in putting the question that led to our Lord's great eschatological (relating to death and final judgment) discourse.

In addition to this sparse information, we learn from the fourth Gospel that on the occasion of the miraculous feeding of the five thousand, it was Andrew who said: "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fishes: but what are these among so many?" (John 6:8-9) Also, when, a few days before our Lord's death, certain Greeks asked Philip that they might see Jesus, Philip referred the matter to Andrew as to one of greater authority, and then both told Christ (John 12: 20-22).

Like the majority of the Twelve, Andrew is not named in the Acts except in the list of the Apostles, where the order of the first four is Peter, John, James, Andrew; nor have the Epistles or Revelation any mention of him. As one of the Twelve, Andrew was admitted to the closest familiarity with our Lord during His public life; he was present at the Last Supper; saw the risen Lord; witnessed the Ascension; shared in the graces and gifts of the first Pentecost, and helped, amid threats and persecution, to establish the Faith in Palestine. When the Apostles went forth to preach to the nations, Andrew seems to have taken an important part, but unfortunately, we have no certainty as to the extent or place of his labors. Our early Church Fathers Eusebius and Origen, gives Scythia as his mission field. Greek Orthodox theologian and historian Nicephorus relying upon early writers, states that Andrew preached in Cappadocia, Galatia, and Bithynia, then in the land of the anthropophagi and the Scythian deserts, afterwards in Byzantium itself, where he appointed St. Stachys as its first bishop, and

finally in Thrace, Macedonia, Thessaly, and Achaia. (Sorry guys, I don't have the room to tell you where all these places are, but all are in modern day parts of Europe and Asia!) It is generally agreed that he was crucified by order of the Roman Governor, Aegeas or Aegeates, at Patrae in Achaia, and that he was bound, not nailed, to the cross, in order to prolong his sufferings. The cross on which he suffered is commonly held to have been the decussate cross (this cross looks like a capital X.), now known as St. Andrew's

cross, though the evidence for this view seems to be no older than the fourteenth century. His martyrdom took place during the reign of Nero, on November 30, A.D. 60; and both the Latin and Greek Churches keep November 30 as his feast day. St. Andrew's relics were translated from Patrae to Constantinople, and deposited in the church of the Apostles there, about A.D. 357. When Constantinople was taken by the French, in the beginning of the thirteenth century, Cardinal Peter of Capua brought the relics to Italy and placed them in the cathedral of Amalfi, where most of them still remain. St. Andrew is honored as their chief patron by Russia, Scotland, Greece, Italy's Amalfi and Barbados. He is also the patron saint of fishmongers, gout, singers, sore throats, spinsters, maidens, old maids, and women wishing to become mothers. St. Andrew pray for us!




