#### **BELIEVE IN JESUS**

As I mentioned last week, for the next few weeks we will put the Gospel of Mark aside and concentrate on the 6<sup>th</sup> Chapter of the Gospel of John. Also known as the Bread of Life Discourse.

Last Sunday we heard the story from the beginning of that chapter of the multiplying of the loaves and fish. Today's story takes place the day after that multiplication miracle. The people were so impressed with what Jesus did yesterday, they hurried to see where he might be today. When they find Him, they strike up a conversation. They ask Jesus three questions, and He answers

them each time. The first question, "Rabbi, when did you get here?" Jesus saw right through this because he knew they were looking for Him because they got a free meal yesterday. So, Jesus told them that they should work for the food that endures for eternal life, and not for food that perishes.

The second question, about work and God, leads to a straightforward answer. He tells them to "Believe in the one he sent." Believe in Jesus. This becomes more relevant each and every year. Believe in Jesus.

This leads to the third and final question. They ask Jesus what miracle he would perform so they could believe Him. This was a challenge to Jesus. They pointed out that their ancestors had Manna from Heaven. This Manna confirmed that Moses was their leader at that time. Now they want a sign that they should believe in Jesus. Do not forget that just the day before, Jesus multiplied the loaves and fish. That is why they went looking for him the next day. Why don't they get it? When Jesus answered them he told them that it was not Moses who gave them bread, but his Father gives them true bread from heaven. They then ask Jesus to give them that bread always. Jesus responds by telling them that he is the bread of life. This response goes on until the end of Chapter 6 in John's Gospel. Over the next few weeks until the twenty-first Sunday of Ordinary Time, we will continue chapter 6 and dive deeper into the Bread of Life Discourse because of its importance.

Jesus is the Bread of Life. Whoever comes to him will never hunger, and whoever believes in him will never thirst. So, if we do not go to Jesus we will hunger. If we do not believe in Jesus, we will thirst. The answer is simple. Go to Jesus.



OCIA AT ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

What is OCIA? (**Order** of Christian Initiation of Adults) OCIA used to be called RCIA (**Rite** of Christian Initiation of Adults). During their November 2021 U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops meetings, the U.S. Bishops changed the name of the **Rite** of Christian Initiation of Adults to **Order** of Christian Initia-

tion of Adults. The name change is intended to better reflect that an "order" is a collection of all the "rites" involved in the process through which adults become members of the Roman Catholic Church. This consists of steps, periods, and rites that make up the model of Christian Initiation as restored in the second Vatican Council.

If you or anyone you know are interested in exploring the Catholic Church as your church home or you have been sitting in the pew next to your Catholic spouse for years wondering what you have to do to become Catholic, or you are a practicing Catholic just wanting to learn more about your faith, please consider this a personal invitation to join us.

Classes will begin on Tuesday August 27, 2024. We will meet here at St. Francis of Assisi in Townsend in the PRC at 9:30 A.M. Classes will run for about an hour and a half (9:30-11:00 A.M.). We will also have an afternoon session in the PRC on Tuesdays from 4:00 P.M. – 5:30 P.M. Each Tuesday session will cover the same material. All are welcome!

Welcome to August St. Francis of Assisi parishioners! In today's "Corner," we will be "talking" about the Apostle James, the son of Zebedee, known as James the Elder and better known as James the Greater.

James, a favorite name among the later Jews, Saint James the Greater was one of the disciples of Jesus—named by Jesus as one of the Sons of Thunder. Coming from the Hebrew name of Jacob, his name means "supplanter" or "replacer." James was a man of extraordinary courage and without jealousy.

We know little of St. James's early life and every time he is mentioned int the Bible, he is with his brother John, the beloved disciple. We do know he was the son of Zebedee and Salome, who was a daughter of a priest. James is styled "the Greater" to distinguish him from the Apostle James "the Less," who was probably shorter of stature or maybe just because he was called first. His parents seem to have been people of means, as appears from the following facts: Zebedee was a fisherman of the Lake of Galilee, who probably lived in or near Bethsaida (John 1:44), perhaps in Capernaum; and had some boatmen or hired men as his usual attendants (Mark 1:20). Salome was one of the pious and wealthy women who afterwards followed Christ and ministered to Him. It is probable, according to Acts 4:13, that John and consequently his brother James had not received the technical training of the rabbinical schools; in this sense they were unlearned and without any official position among the Jews. According to the social rank of their parents, they must have been men of ordinary education, when talking of Jewish life.

James is thought to be a cousin of Jesus, by the sister of the Virgin Mary, and the brother of Saint Jude Thaddeus. As mentioned before, he was the brother of John, the beloved disciple, and probably the elder of the two. He was content living in the shadow of his brother John. They were an inseparable pair (Mark 1:19-20, Matthew 4:21, Luke 5:1-11). James worked as a fisherman with his brother John, his father Zebedee, and his partner Simon.

John and James were followers of John the Baptist and left their lives as a fisherman when Jesus called them to be fisher of men. James the Greater was chosen by Jesus to be one of the twelve apostles and was given the mission to spread the gospel of Jesus. He was one of the few who was able to discuss the meanings of the parables and Christ's direct questions and receive a direct answer. James followed Jesus as one of his disciples until Jesus was crucified.

He made a pilgrimage to Spain to spread the word. James was the first of the twelve to become a martyr. When James returned to Judea (Jerusalem), he was beheaded by King Herod Agrippa I (10 BC - 44 AD) in the year 44. This is detailed in the Bible in Acts 12 of the New Testament. James' accuser was so moved by his courage and willingness to face execution that he converted to Christianity on the spot and asked to be executed with James. The Roman officers beheaded both men simultaneously.

The remains, or relics, of Saint James the Greater are said to be buried in Santiago de Compostela in Galicia (Spain) explaining why Saint James the Greater is the patron saint of Spain. St. James the Greater is universally regarded as the patron of pilgrims to the Holy Land, because after establishing the Christian religion in Spain, he returned to Judea on a pilgrimage and was there beheaded. The scallop-shell is the recognized symbol of all pilgrims to the Holy Land, as it abounds on the shores of Palestine. When returning to their own country, pilgrims displayed the scallop-shell in their hats, to show that they had carried out their pious intentions. He is also the patron of laborers. The Feast Day of Saint James the Greater is July 25th. St. James pray for us! Next week we will discuss James' brother John! Enjoy your week!

#### 2023-24 FISCAL YEAR ENDING AND THIS YEAR'S BUDGET


St. Francis of Assisi completed its recent fiscal year (FY2024) on June 30th with revenues (collections, donations, gift shop, etc.) totaling \$196,561.14 and incurred expenses of \$196,086.93. Therefore, we had a modest net income of \$474.21.

Fr. Antonio and the Parish Finance Committee met to set up our budget for the 2024-25 fiscal year. The budget process starts with the Diocese informing us how much our assessment for the coming year will be; calculating its assessments based on the income from the last reported fiscal year, which was the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023. For this new fiscal year, our assessment actually went down compared to last year and while a smaller assessment may seem like a good thing, it is actually an indicator that our collections went down in FY2022-23.

Over the past couple of years expenses have gone up. You've seen it at home and we too have seen it at the Parish. We have not made an ask since before the COVID pandemic, but, at this time, we are asking parishioners to consider adding a little extra to their weekly giving to help out the Parish. This will go a long way towards ensuring we meet our rising expenses.

Lastly, we continue to explore different ways of saving on expense items, while also trying to anticipate major expenses. However, focusing solely on trying to cut expenses is not going to allow us to avoid running a deficit in the coming years. We need parishioners to consider helping out with extra contributions.

In closing, thank you for all you have done to support our Parish this past year. It is through your continued generosity that we are able to maintain this beautiful Parish we call home and that visitors can enjoy the little church by the Little River.


