#### THE WAY WE TREAT EACH OTHER IS THE WAY WE TREAT CHRIST



Today's readings play with the question of why we should bother to be good. Living an ethical life is demanding; it requires us to examine our consciences, own up to our feelings, and strive to be better. We don't always get a physical reward out of it. In fact, it can sometimes seem that those who do not take this kind of responsibility are better off—living without guilt and simply enjoying life.

Expecting something in return for our goodness is the logic displayed by the wicked people of the first reading. They argue that if just people are really in the right, they ought to be

able to count on protection from God. It is not only fully wicked people who think this way; Jesus' disciples fall into this pattern, too. They argue over who is the greatest, seeking honor and recognition for what they have given up to follow Christ. They deeply misunderstand the purpose of their own labors.

Jesus, speaking to his apostles, said this; "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all." Does the image of the last being first reflect the ideals of our nation? Do we put the most vulnerable first? What is our obligation to helping those who are affected by war, poverty, plague, chronic illness, or challenges with mental health? Is our nation built upon a bedrock that allows all people to flourish, or only a chosen few?

At the heart of conflict, disorder, and strife are the sins of jealousy and selfishness. Born out of entitlement, privilege, and rampant consumption is the never-ending and all-consuming desire for more. More wealth. More comfort. More security. More individuality. These things, in themselves, are not evil. However, so often, "more" is achieved through the exploitation of others and a primal fear that leads us to look after our own needs before the needs of others.

So too do many of us think along these lines: We believe that our efforts earn us the good things that come to us in this life. But God's logic is not our own and imposing our own parameters on God's action is always a recipe for disappointment. That is not to say that God is not generous; God gives us graces and gifts far beyond our comprehension. But God's gifts do not always come according to our own plans or on our expected timeline, and so they can be hard to receive. Jesus combats his disciples' pride by placing a child in their midst. Receiving children also defies our usual moral calculus. We don't always get much out of it, and yet all of us are called to it, whether as parents or as teachers or simply as decent members of a society who sometimes have to share

public space with children. There are nice moments when our hearts are mercifully filled with a child's sweetness, but very often, dealing with children leaves us running on empty. Expecting our children to fill us up or to offer a reward for our investment in them is a recipe for disappointment. And yet, continuing to nurture and attend to them is simply the right thing to do.

When we engage with others without expecting a reward, we become like servants. It doesn't feel particularly good, and yet we are all called to treat children – and each other – this way. We are called to patience and gentleness and understanding in all our interactions. Even though it does not always look or feel like it, the way we treat each other is the way we treat Christ.

#### THE APOSTLE SIMON



Today's Catechism Corner is all about the Apostle Simon, but again not too much is known from the New Testament about the apostle Simon. The only times he's mentioned in the Synoptic Gospels and Acts is when the evangelist lists the names of the Twelve. Even in these simple lists, there is some mild confusion. (I bet you didn't see that coming!) Depending on which New Testament translation one reads, his name has also been listed


as: Simon Kananaios; Simon Kananites; Simon the Cananean; and Simon Zealotes. Because of these various names, over the centuries it was assumed that the Apostle Simon was from Cana, the Biblical site of the wedding feast where Jesus performed His first miracle by turning water into wine. Language experts (which I am not) now say that the words Kananaios and Kananites both derive from the Hebrew word qana (kana), which means "zealot."

There is even confusion over the designation *zealot*. First, it was important for the New Testament authors to differentiate between the two apostles named Simon. Simon Peter became known simply as Peter and the second Simon became Simon the Zealot. In the Gospels and Acts, it is unclear why the authors chose the term *zealot*. The easy answer most people like is that he was a member of a group of Jewish revolutionaries who were intent on ridding the Holy Land of their Roman occupiers. A relatively recent interpretation of the word suggests that the apostle was given the nickname because it reflected his zeal for the good news being shared by his friend and teacher, Jesus. (I like this explanation better!)

What is known of Simon is that he was chosen by Jesus at some time during His ministry to be one of His original Twelve Apostles. Why he was chosen, doesn't really matter; Jesus saw something in Simon that made him special. He would then go on to be a firsthand witness to Jesus' healing miracles and Resurrection. Simon would have heard the Sermon on the Mount; he would have been there at the Miracle of the loaves and fishes. He would have consumed the sanctified bread and wine at the Last Supper; been at the Garden of Gethsemane, and then left Jesus (like Peter) to suffer His Passion alone. BUT Simon would have redeemed himself – as all of the other apostles (except Judas Iscariot) – after Pentecost, by spreading the Gospel to the ends of the earth!

Where the Apostle Simon went after receiving the Holy Spirit at Pentecost is a matter of confusing and improbable speculation. I bet you didn't see THAT coming! There is very strong evidence that St. Simon went to the Caucasian Iberia which is the ancient Greek term for the old kingdom of Georgia. Historically, this was land between the Caspian Sea and the eastern Black Sea, whose most prominent geologic feature is the Caucasus Mountains. Weriosphora is the region of the ancient kingdom of Georgia that is presently known as the Republic of Abkhazia (borders Russia and Georgia). There is a very strong local tradition that says it was here that the Apostle Simon preached the Gospel the last ten years of his life. It was here in 55 AD, during the roman persecution, that he was martyred for his faith and was originally buried.

St. Simon's original burial place is at an area called New Athos in a tiny white Orthodox Church called St. Simon the Canaanite. It was in these mountains that St. Simon would hide in a cave from the region's Roman Soldiers who had been sent to kill him and all his Christian converts. The cave is visited by hundreds of pilgrims on a daily basis. It was in this wooded area near the cave that St. Simon was martyred. Legend says he met his death by being sawed in half. St. Simon's final resting place is right next to St. Peter's martyrdom site. The Chapel of St. Joseph is built right over the crypt containing the earthly remains of Simon. How the Apostle's bones arrived there is a complete mystery. But more than likely the relics were saved and moved because of Muslim invasion.

The name Simon comes from the Hebrew word *Shim'on*, which means "he has heard." He heard the Truth from our Savior and spread the Good News to the "ends of the earth." Perhaps this was his special attribute that appealed to Jesus when he was choosing His special twelve followers. This may have been why the Lord gave him the nickname "The Zealot." Rather than trying to grab the limelight as did Peter and the sons of Zebedee throughout the Gospels, Simon humbly chose instead to listen and learn, literally at the feet of his Master, with an intensity and a zeal that made him stand out among his peers.

"Simon, the unknown apostle, is the patron of the countless Christians who go through life without fame, without a name. He is the patron saint of couriers, tanners, woodcutters and sawyers. He is the patron of the army of unknown workers in the vineyard of the Lord, who toil in the last places for the kingdom of God. He is the patron of the unknown soldiers of Christ, who struggle on the disregarded and thankless fronts. No one notices, no one praises, no one rewards this obscure and often misunderstood apostle – no one except the Father, who sees through all obscurity, who understands all misjudgments." *The Twelve Apostles of Jesus* by Richard Orzeck p. 62
