## DEACON'S NOTES

#### **EASTER SUNDAY**

The primary concern of these women as they approached the tomb was determining who would roll away the stone. They had observed its dimensions when it was placed, noting that it was approximately seven feet in diameter and weighed at least a ton. However, upon their arrival, they found that the stone had been moved. The significance of this minor detail is profound. It symbolizes the essence of Easter, which is about the act of rolling back the stone. Opening our hearts and lives to Christ is the same as rolling back the stone of the tomb.

Throughout history, humans have attempted to overcome obstacles and find spiritual connection. The concept of original sin represents an initial separation from divinity. Various forms of challenges and ethical dilemmas have emerged from this idea. Across different eras and cultures, people have sought to achieve spiritual unity, but their efforts were often hindered and redirected by these challenges. God rolled back the stone, and Christ emerged from the tomb offering eternal happiness, forgiveness, grace, and the power of Resurrection to all who follow Him.

This weekend, churches are filled for Easter not only to mark the joyous conclusion of Jesus' crucifixion and death but also to signify a new beginning for humanity. The Church was founded not merely on Jesus' moral teachings or His sacrificial death; it was established through His Resurrection. The Resurrection of Jesus is significant both for Him and for the promise of new life for us.

Sunday was just another workday for the people of Jerusalem. Their sabbath had already ended. They were going about their busy workday. So, many people in Jerusalem were unaware of the Resurrection that morning. Some heard about it later but remained unaffected. Despite happening nearby, it didn't impact everyone. Today, millions of believers are touched by the Resurrection, thanks to faith. Faith brings Christ into our lives, enabling us to experience conversion and receive His grace and mission.

Don't let Easter be a spiritual day trip for you. Make it the renewal of your journey with Christ in His Church. In a world that knows so much death, physical death, spiritual death, moral death, a culture in crisis, here is the Lord of life. Today, He approaches us as He did His initial disciples with one word,

"Peace." This encompasses peace with the Father, peace with others, and peace within ourselves—a profound peace that provides fortitude in any adversity. We understand how a fierce storm can agitate the waters, yet there remains tranquility deep beneath. Our life in Christ can reflect this calmness.

We all face challenges, but Christ offers peace in any storm. God removed the barrier of sin; now it's up to us to embrace Christ. Don't be indifferent. The power of His Resurrection is available through the Church's sacraments and rituals.

That first Easter, the stone of sin was rolled away. This Easter let's open the door to new life in Christ. Open the door! See how much Christ has to offer you!

I wish to welcome our new members that were initiated into the Church this Easter Vigil! It truly is a blessing for us as a community to welcome you, Angela, Jeff, Summer, Jacob, Terry and Carolyn! Our RCIA class was educational, but more importantly, extremely inspiring because of all of you!

Now, you may ask what is RCIA? RCIA stands for Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. It is primarily designed for adults who have not been baptized and are seeking to join the Catholic Church. However, many parishes also include baptized Christians in the RCIA program for convenience and community building. The program involves learning about the Church's teachings and preparing for the sacraments of initiation, such as Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist. The RCIA is a journey of faith and conversion, guided by the Holy Spirit, and is rooted in the Church's mission to evangelize and bring people to Christ (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1212 -1233). This is normally a full year program!!

While visiting another state, you may have heard the process called OCIA at a Catholic Church. You heard or read right! The process by which adults formally join the Catholic Church has traditionally been referred to as the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Two years ago, in November of 2021, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops approved a new translation of the process and its corresponding curriculum, now known as the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA). The decision to change the name stems from the idea that the Catholic journey is continual. It is a lifelong commitment each catechumen or candidate is making to the Church. Another reason for the name change is to more accurately portray the fact that there are multiple rites integrated into the larger process of becoming Catholic. The process itself is not one "rite" there are multiple rites. These rites include a discovery stage, a learning and consideration stage, a deep reflection period, and continued learning and growing. And while there are rites integrated into the process of becoming Catholic, not all their timelines vary in length. Hence, OCIA more accurately depicts the varied rites' different timelines. Our diocese will be initiating the OCIA program starting with instruction this year.




