# PASTOR'S NOTES

#### THE OCTAVE OF EASTER AND DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

The second Sunday of Easter is also referred to as the Octave of Easter, meaning that Easter is not just one day, but a string of eight days all tied together. Easter is such a great Feast that it is celebrated during the entire week that goes from Easter Sunday to the very next Sunday.

The readings for this Sunday are always about mercy, trust, and forgiveness of sins. "Doubting Thomas" is an important figure for us as we seek to deepen our faith. This gospel passage is proclaimed on the second Sunday of Easter as an example of

God's great love and mercy for us and helps to clarify to future believers any doubt about the resurrection.

Thomas was not present when Jesus appeared to some of the disciples. He gains his nickname "Doubting Thomas" when he doubts his friend's encounter with the risen Lord and says, "Unless I see the marks of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

When Jesus appears again to the disciples and Thomas was with them, Jesus invites him to put his finger into Jesus' hand and his hand into his side and told Thomas to believe once again in the greatness of God. In a moment of awe, Thomas responds, "My Lord and my God."


Today's gospel gives a bit of relief when we find it challenging to believe. Even the people who were there had a hard time trusting what they saw and struggled to maintain faith. The important thing is not to lean too heavily on those doubts, because the life and peace that comes through Jesus is too essential. Jesus wants a relationship with each one of us. We just need to believe.

The Octave Sunday of Easter has been recently called Mercy Sunday or the Feast of Divine Mercy. It is a new feast proclaimed by John Paul II, in the year 2000, during the canonization of Sr. Faustina, whom Jesus himself revealed asking for this feast to be celebrated on this particular Sunday following Easter Sunday. The Holy Father perceived a deep connection between the "The Easter Mystery of the Redemption – the suffering, death, and resurrection of the Lord – and this Feast of Divine Mercy." This feast, the pope said, "adds so much more meaning to the Easter celebration."

The whole celebration is about God's love and mercy for us through his only begotten Son our Lord Jesus Christ. It's no coincidence Pope John Paul II died on April 2, 2005, The Vigil of Divine Mercy Sunday. Nor is it coincidence, our beloved Pope Francis, whose papacy personified Mercy itself, receives farewell on the Vigil of Divine Mercy.

Like Thomas, we have the witness of the believing community: a more than two-thousand-year-old testimony of the people of God who continue to say, "We have seen the Lord." The truth has not changed, and the promise of a personal encounter with Jesus remains as real as it did on the First Easter Sunday. We can have a personal encounter with Jesus every time we participate in the Eucharist through the Liturgy of the Word and, in a very special way, through the breaking of bread.





Welcome to the weekend after our beautiful celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! I certainly hope you enjoyed all the information in the Corner this past Lent with Leonardo's fresco of the Last Supper. As I have stated before, Michael and I had the opportunity to view this in Milan, Italy. There are no words to express my reaction. It's just overwhelming! My jaw hit the floor! The beauty, the distinctiveness, the history of the artist! And this magnificent piece of art is in what we would call a dining hall! Thank you so very much, Ilene Rainwater, for enlightening us with your research and knowledge of this well-

known artwork. I truly appreciate the time that you put in and graciously shared with us during all of Lent!

This weekend, we always celebrate the Divine Mercy according to the calendar of the Church. Mercy is the deepest form of love, and the God who is love would be supremely the merciful one. In some ways God's mercy is even more powerful than his creative power, for, St. Thomas Aquanis tells us in his *Summa Theologiae*, the reconciliation of a sinner is a greater thing than the creation of the universe.

The actual designation of the Octave Day of Easter being Divine Mercy Sunday is the result of a request made by our Lord to Saint Faustina Kowalska, a Polish sister, in the first half of the 20th century in the twenties and thirties, to ask the Church, the Holy Father, to establish that Sunday, the Octave of Easter, as the Feast of Divine Mercy. So, on April 30, 2000, Pope John Paul II canonized Maria Faustina Kowalska and declared the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday. To me that is **TOTALLY** amazing!

Think about this: In his treatment of the sacrament of penance, St. Thomas describes and examines the Church's ancient rite of public penance and the public reconciliation of penitents. This is a rite long fallen into disuse, but its basic logic and spiritual essence can still be perceived in the contours of contemporary liturgical practice. The rite of solemn, public penance began on Ash Wednesday. Public sinners who had approached the bishop for pardon were dressed in sackcloth and doused with ashes and "expelled" from the church. They attended all the daily observances of Lent, but from the porch or vestibule of the church, not inside like the ordinary faithful. There they would ask for the prayers of the faithful. On Holy Thursday, the penitents were received back into the church nave and were given absolution by the bishop. From then on, they participated in the solemn worship of Holy Week and Easter with everyone else.

But here comes the interesting detail: the catechumens of course received Holy Communion at the Mass of the Easter Vigil and then attended for the whole Easter octave dressed in their white baptismal robes.

But the penitents had to wait for the octave of Easter (now Divine Mercy Sunday) before they were admitted to Holy Communion. This Sunday was par excellence, the day of the full reconciliation of sinners! YUP, uh-huh – don't complain about how we celebrate the Sacrament of Confession now!!!

Now just consider that their waiting after their readmission corresponded exactly to the days of our Divine Mercy novena, that is, from Good Friday on.... until today's feast. It would almost seem that Our Lord had arranged the novena a feast of his mercy to reestablish spiritually this ancient period of reconciliation and Eucharistic grace. But now it is for all the faithful who are penitents.

So let us never doubt the depths of today's great feast of the Divine Mercy, whatever any liturgical expert or theology student thinks. And note also, that a careful search in St. Thomas Aquinas always yields very edifying insights for those who have the patience to persevere.



#### BECOMING A DEACON - INFORMATIONAL SESSIONS

Before an athlete or performer gets ready for a major event, they practice. They may go through many of the activities they will do during the event but it doesn't count yet. When the Diocese starts a new Deacon Formation class, they kind of start with some practice. At the end of 2021, the diocese announced they were forming a new cohort for people interested in becoming deacons. They were going to host a series of informational sessions to let men know what was involved in the process. They even invited deacon candidates who were going to be ordained in 2022 to share some of their experiences. However, they also added some discussions and exercises on spirituality to each of these information sessions. We

learned the Examin Prayer and how the Holy Spirit might be calling us to formation. They even gave us some homework assignments. It really was a little taste of what we were going to be doing if we joined the formation program.



#### APRIL 27, 2025 - DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Renew our hearts and minds, so that the word which always brings us together will be "brother", and our way of life will always be that of: Shalom, Peace, Salaam!
