CHRIST, THE GOOD SHEPHERD



Today's readings cover many topics. Traditionally, this Sunday is known as Good Shepherd Sunday because the gospel always comes from John's gospel, chapter 10, where Jesus tells us in various ways that he is the Good Shepherd.

Since there are so many themes, I would just comment on a few ideas. Our gospel today takes us back to before time began, back to when there was only the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. In this part of John's gospel, Jesus identifies himself as the Good Shepherd. In doing so, however, Jesus is identifying himself as God him-

self. The connection of the Good Shepherd with Jesus' divinity can be found in chapter 34 of the prophet Ezekiel. God did not hold back in condemning the shepherds of Israel, i.e., the kings of Israel, for the sinful and incompetent way they governed God's people. As consequence for this poor leadership, God spoke through Ezekiel when he declared: "I myself will look after and tend my sheep." (Ezek. 34,11). In the image of the Good Shepherd, we see the fulfillment of this prophecy. In case of any doubt as to whether our Shepherd is divine, Jesus makes it clear in the last sentence of today's gospel when he says: "the Father and I are one." The Jewish leaders took offense and wanted to put him to death for blasphemy (saying that he was equal to God). Jesus did not back down on what he had said, but even more strongly, he repeated what he wanted them to accept when he said; "If I am not doing the works of my Father, then do not believe. But if I do them, even though you do not believe me, believe the works, so that you may know and understand that the Father is in me and I am in the Father." With this authority backing him up, is it any surprise that Jesus expects his sheep to hear his voice and for them to follow him? Not only does he have the right to expect us to listen to him and follow him, but he also has the power to give us eternal life.

The Book of Revelation does not delight in horror, it was simply encouraging God's people not to lose hope, especially those who suffer for being faithful to Christ. In the Book of Revelation John sees God's holy people surrounding God's throne and praising him. They are dressed in white, symbolizing their inner holiness, and they are holding palm branches as a symbol of their sharing in Christ's victory over sin and death. Their sufferings are over, God will protect them, and the Lamb of God will shepherd them and provide for all their needs.

Our First reading from The Acts of the Apostles shows us that following Christ is not always a piece of cake. Paul and Barnabas were struggling with times of success and times of failures, times of peace and times of turmoil, times when others accepted them and times when they were rejected. They never quit; they moved on.

God calls us to keep on struggling to follow him and serve him, and when we fail, to get back and not to give up.

This sums up our reflections centered around Jesus as our shepherd, Jeus who always existed, and Jesus who in the course of time, took on our human nature to show us how to live the kind of life that will lead to eternal life with God.

CONSOLATION/DESOLATION

Holy Week and Easter can bring us to a very full feeling of spirituality. We feel a closeness and a thankfulness to God that we may not feel at other times of the year. That tremendous feeling of spirituality is frequently referred to "consolation." It is a feeling that we hope stays with us forever or possibly even grows stronger over the coming days. Sadly, the feeling does not usually last for an extended time.


With the distractions of daily living and other activities, we may not realize that we are starting to drift away from that great consolation. After some time, we may start to wonder why that feeling has gone and also wonder if it will ever come back. Knowing that we have that desire to return to that great state of consolation should be comforting but it may not be enough.

In fact, sometimes that state can get even worse. We can start to feel that we will never get back to that state of consolation and possibly stop trying. This is when we've reached a state of "desolation." Desolation can be rough because we may find that some of the things we used to do to feel closer to God are not as meaningful. We may start to feel disconnected from the Church and our parish. We may feel that God no longer cares. We may start listening to those whispers from Satan that it is okay to back off on our spiritual habits.

St. Ignacius addressed this state by saying that desolation is not the time to make big changes but rather to make an investment to get back into that state of consolation. Instead of dropping some of our spiritual habits, it is time to try out some new habits. Maybe if we've stopped our nightly prayer, we should pick it back up and possibly add in a morning prayer routine. Perhaps we could attend a morning Mass here and there.

The other part of what St. Ignacius recommends is that when we return to a state of consolation that we start planning for the next cycle of desolation. Because desolation will return. Our challenge is to make that next cycle as short as possible. And by planning for it, we can recognize it faster and work to get out of it faster.

As we continue to proceed past Easter, take the time to start planning for desolation. While we'll pray that it never comes, we'll be prepared should it return and ready ourselves to get back to consolation.







Today, we celebrate "Good Shepherd Sunday" where we reflect on the care and love of Jesus for us. JOIN BISHOP BARRON AND PEOPLE AROUND THE WORLD IN PRAYING THE ROSARY DURING THE MONTH OF MAY







A Brief Introduction

On May 8, 2025, Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost, O.S.A., was elected the 267th pope, taking the name Pope Leo XIV.

Pope Leo was born September 14, 1955, in Chicago, Illinois. Before his election as pope, Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost served for over two decades in Peru. In 2014, Pope Francis appointed Cardinal Prevost as Apostolic Administrator of Callao. As a member of the Order of Saint Augustine (O.S.A.), he brings to the papacy decades of experience in missionary service, especially among the poor, marginalized, and migrants. He has been an advocate for ecclesial reform and deeper dialogue within the global Church

He served as Prior General of the Augustinians from 2001 to 2013. Before becoming a bishop, he worked in Peru as a seminary professor, judicial vicar, parish pastor, and diocesan official. He was clevated to the College of Cardinals by Pope Francis on September 30, 2023. His prior roles include serving as Prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops from 2023 to 2025, where he played a key role in shaping episcopal leadership worldwide.



Pope Leo's First Steps as Pontiff:What to Expect from the Early Days of His Papacy

His First Words: The Urbi et Orbi Blessing

Pope Leo XIV delivered his first address from St. Peter's Basilica, known as the *Urbi* et *Orbi* ("to the city and to the world") blessing. The first words of this short, prayerful message, which he gave from the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica following the "*Habemus Papam*!" announcement, were "Peace be with all of you!" He continued by saying, "The world needs Christ's light. Humanity needs him to be the bridge so that God and his love can reach us."

These remarks set a tone of hope, reconciliation, and a focus on Christ as the source of unity and peace for humanity. Pope Leo XIV's initial address was resonant, highlighting both a blessing for all and the essential role of faith in bridging divisions and bringing God's love to the world.

His First Public Mass: The Inauguration

Within a week, and likely on Sunday, Pope Leo XIV will celebrate the Mass of Inauguration in St. Peter's Square, marking the formal start of his ministry. This Liturgy, attended by thousands, includes the bestowal of the Fisherman's Ring and pallium (symbols of papal authority). A private Mass with the cardinals in the Sistine Chapel often precedes it.
