BE A "KEEPER" OF GOD'S WORDS



After the resurrection, the Apostles and the little flock following, who believed in Jesus, were Jews. They did not see themselves as part of a new religion; thus, they continued to follow their Jewish laws, customs, rituals and traditions. However, there were problems when the Gentiles started to believe in Jesus. Many Jews who accepted Jesus as their savior and messiah insisted that Gentiles had to adopt Jewish ways if they wanted to consider themselves followers of Jesus. So, when our first reading today speaks of circumcision, it is really talking about all the rules and customs the Jews were bound to follow – dietary laws, feast

days, etc. To solve the problem, the leaders of the Church at Antioch, including St. Paul, went to Jerusalem, in order to meet, with some of the other Apostles. Paul insisted that we are saved by Jesus' death and resurrection and the Jewish traditions and laws, other than moral and ethical laws like the Ten Commandments, were no longer required for salvation. Paul's views were accepted by the group.

All throughout history, the Church has had challenges to face. When we read about some of those challenges like we heard about in our first reading we wonder how the Church survived – but it did, because Christ is with his Church and it is guided by the Holy Spirit.

The Book of Revelation reminds us of the heavenly kingdom which we all hope to be a part of some day. It will be a kingdom free of suffering, pain and death and there will be eternal happiness. Today's reading describes God's kingdom as a great city. Notice they face in all directions, north, south, east and west. It's a way of saying that God is inviting people from everywhere to enter. Unfortunately, in many other places in the Scriptures, we learn of those who choose not to be there.

This leads into the gospel which was taken from Jesus' words at the Last Supper according to John. Jesus has just told his Apostles that soon he would reveal to them but not to the world. One of the apostles asked what that meant. Jesus answers, "whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make a dwelling with him." Jesus is telling us, loving him, has to precede his revealing himself to us. First comes loving him, and then comes seeing him. Jesus said, "whoever loves me will keep my word." In other words, love is not some nice, warm fuzzy feeling, it's a practical, down-to-earth thing. It's more what we do than what we feel. Our culture pays attention only to the feeling part of love and that's why many people have forgotten that love involves the things we do toward God and to each other.

Being a "keeper of words" as Jesus commands in today's gospel, means living out the principles and commands that Jesus has taught us and has passed down through generations. It involves a deep, intentional effort to be in tune with the Holy Spirit. This alignment is not just about external actions but is also about an inner transformation, reflecting Christ's love and values in every aspect of our lives.

In real life, keeping Jesus' words can be seen in how we interact with other people in our daily lives, the decisions we make and have made, and the priorities we set. For instance, the commandment to love your neighbor as yourself. This principle can be lived out in countless ways, such as showing kindness to strangers, offering help to those in need, forgiving those who have wronged us, and advocating for justice and equality in our communi-

ties. Moreover, keeping Jesus' words involves continual self-examination and growth. It requires us to regularly engage with the Scriptures to understand more deeply what Jesus taught and how we can apply it to our lives. This might mean setting aside time for prayer and Bible study, participating in a faith community that encourages spiritual growth, and being open to the Holy Spirit's guidance in our decisions and actions.

There is a road map to the heavenly Jerusalem that Jesus is giving us today: First comes obedience, which leads to love which leads to the revealing himself to us and our dwelling with him for eternity. May the Holy Spirit guide us there.





Happy Memorial Day weekend and welcome to the Catechism Corner!

As stated last week, the Church sets aside the month of May for Mary, the Mother of our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ. To honor Mary, Catholic churches will have May crownings and set aside special times for a parish rosary. Like any good mother, Mary seeks the good of her children, which means helping them attain heaven, in opposition to the devil, who seeks their destruction.

Not only do we honor Mary; we also invoke her or ask her intercession. Some objectors say that we should pray to God alone. Well, we certainly pray directly to God, for we regard the Our Father as the best and most beautiful of all prayers and frequently recite it. But we pray also to Mary, asking her to intercede for us with her divine Son. Because of Mary's concern for her spiritual offspring, we invoke her assistance in the holy rosary, "now and at the hour of our death."

Our Protestant brothers and sisters have difficulty with the devotion we give to our Heavenly Mother. They oppose the rosary because they say it violates the biblical doctrine that Jesus is the "one mediator between God and man" which is from 1 Timothy 2:5 and this is the scripture they quote to defend their statement. Ironically, in that same passage, St. Paul urges us to be collaborators with Jesus in bringing about the salvation of the souls: "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all men, for kings and all who are in high positions" from 1 Timothy 2:1. This is why you may have heard that Catholics, when they read the Bible, are contextualists. This means we interpret Scripture within its historical and cultural context. What do the words say? What did the human author intend his audience to understand? What was he trying to say? What is the context? Spiritual Sense: what is the deeper meaning? And are guided by the Church's Tradition and Magisterium. This approach acknowledges that the Bible is not always easy to understand from 2 Peter 3:15-16 and requires interpretation within the community of the Church from 2 Thessalonians 2:15; and the CCC 80-83. Unlike the Protestant view, which often emphasizes personal interpretation, Catholics believe the Church has the authoritative role in interpreting Scripture from 1 Timothy 3:15; Matthew. 18:17; CCC 85-88). This ensures continuity with the apostolic Tradition and guards against misinterpretation from 2 Peter 1:20-21. In fact, we read in the Old Testament that God positively commanded Eliphaz and his two friends to go to the holy man Job and seek his intercession: "My servant Job shall pray for you; his face I will accept, that folly be not imputed to you" (Job 42:8). Therefore, we Catholics act right when they say: "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death." **Sorry**, I digress! That is another subject for the Corner!!

Before I finish, I would like to state two truths that the Church teaches most emphatically: #1: God alone, the Supreme, Infinite Being, must be adored. To adore any creature, however exalted, would be to commit idolatry. It is simply absurd and also grossly unfair to say that Catholics adore Mary. #2: Jesus Christ alone is our Mediator of Redemption. He alone, by His supreme sacrifice, of infinite value, redeemed and ransomed mankind. So, you ask: "What Honor May be Shown to Mary?" Let's "talk" about that next week! 
