LECTIO DIVINA



Prayer is essential for an authentic Christian life, serving as the primary means of communicating with God. It is one of the Church's most treasured practices, both communally and individually. The Church's holy doctrines have developed from prayerful readings of Sacred Scripture over millennia. The Holy Mass, our ultimate prayer, demonstrates how Scripture reading and sacraments combine in liturgy.


We can see how the prayerful reading of Sacred Scripture has always fueled the spiritual life of the Church. This is the basis of lectio divina. *"Lectio divina is a great river that carries all the riches accumulated over the course of Church history by the fervent readers of God's Word. Lectio divina is never solely our own reading. It feeds on the interpretation of those who have preceded us...if we persevere in lectio divina and silent listening to what the Spirit is saying to the Churches, our effort will be rewarded by unheard-of jewels and riches."* Cardinal Robert Sarah

THE FOUR STEPS OF LECTIO DIVINA:

The USCCB has provided a helpful summary on how to pray with Scripture using this four-step method of lectio divina, which we will quote here:

1. Read.....The first element of this type of prayer is reading (*lectio*): you take a short passage from the Bible, preferably a Gospel passage and read it carefully, perhaps three or more times. Let it really soak in.
2. MeditateThe second element is meditation (*meditatio*). By using your imagination enter into the Biblical scene in order to "see" the setting, the people, and the unfolding action. It is through this meditation that you encounter the text and discover its meaning for your life.
3. Pray.....The next element is prayer (*oratio*) or your personal response to the text: asking for graces, offering praise or thanksgiving, seeking healing or forgiveness. In this prayerful engagement with the text, you open yourself up to the possibility of contemplation.
4. Contemplate....Contemplation (*contemplatio*) is a gaze turned toward Christ and the things of God. By God's action of grace, you may be raised above meditation to a state of seeing or experiencing the text as mystery and reality. In contemplation, you come into an experiential contact with the One behind and beyond the text.

BECOMING A DEACON – INFORMATIONAL SESSIONS

Before an athlete or performer gets ready for a major event, they practice. They may go through many of the activities they will do during the event but it doesn't count yet. When the Diocese starts a new Deacon Formation class, they kind of start with some practice. At the end of 2021, the diocese announced they were forming a new cohort for people interested in becoming deacons. They were going to host a series of informational sessions to let men know what was involved in the process. They even invited deacon candidates who were going to be ordained in 2022 to share some of their experiences. However, they also added some discussions and exercises on spirituality to each of these information sessions. We learned the Examin Prayer and how the Holy Spirit might be calling us to formation. They even gave us some homework assignments. It really was a little taste of what we were going to be doing if we joined the formation program.

MAY IS FOR MARY

Remember (most of us!) growing up celebrating the first weekend in May with May Crowning? If you weren't selected to crown Mary (like me) you might have been in a procession with the lights dimmed (we celebrated on Sunday evening) carrying flashlights glowing and rimmed with whatever flowers might be blooming. And of course, the beautiful songs of Immaculate Mary and Ava Maria.

In the northern hemisphere May brings the height of spring booming. In pre-Christian times May was a feast day heralding the fertility of the Earth and the month of May was dedicated to different goddess figures such as Artemis (Greece) and Flora (Rome). In Medieval times the month of May slowly became dedicated to different celebrations of Mary, whose "Yes" to God is the witness to fruitfulness. By the 18th century it became a time of daily devotion to Our Lady, and it became commonplace to crown statues of Mary with wreaths of flowers.

The month of May has been set apart by the Church for the special devotion to the Mother of God. The 13th of May is the Memorial of Our Lady of Fatima. Around convents and monasteries, you will always find a statue of Mary inviting her children to go in and pay a visit to her Jesus. We hold this month special because, of course, Mary is the mother of Jesus and also our Beloved Mother to whom we can turn to constantly for guidance and prayers.

We honor the Blessed Virgin Mary through Marian devotions, practices of piety and faith directed toward her, encompassing prayers, meditations, and other actions that express reverence and love for Mary, Mother of Jesus. Scripture reveals Mary as mother, wife, cousin, and friend. Over the centuries she has carried many names including Queen of Peace, Gate of Heaven, Untier of Knots, and Mother of Sorrows just to name a few.

There have been many beautiful names and devotions honoring Mary. In the Litany of Loreto Mary is referred to as Vessel, Ark, House, and Tower. We know that the closeness she experienced to our Lord during her pregnancy was much more intimate than these descriptions. She was indeed "full of grace." Marian piety, besides novenas, prayers, and celebrations, also includes various articles. Among the many medals dedicated to the Blessed Virgin the most recognized is the "Miraculous Medal" dating back to its origin of 1830. As with the "Miraculous Medal", many other devotional articles have been established through apparitions such as those of Lourdes and Fatima. The Rosary of course is the most widely prayed. The scapular was also established at Fatima, the most common being the scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

Marian devotions have become increasingly popular worldwide. There are many, such as Our Lady of Guadalupe and Our Lady of Lourdes, celebrated by many countries but also many local and regional celebrations throughout the world.

How can you establish your own devotion to Mary? There is personal prayer, the Rosary, the Angelis, litanies, novenas, spiritual reading, a pilgrimage or many specific prayers to our Blessed Mother. In his Apostolic Letter *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, Pope John Paul II emphasized the importance of Marian devotions by quoting Saint Louis de Montfort: "Since Mary is of all creatures the one most conformed to Jesus Christ, it follows that among all devotions that which most consecrates and conforms a soul to our Lord is devotion to Mary, his Holy Mother, and that the more a soul is consecrated to her the more will it be consecrated to Jesus Christ."

However you choose to devote time to Mary, your reward will be joy and intimacy with our Blessed Mother along with a deeper relationship with Christ.


