THE POWER OF THE HOLY SPIRIT



Today is indeed a special feast, the third most important feast in the Church year, the feast that celebrates the completion of Jesus' saving work with his sending of the Holy Spirit. Today we celebrate the birth of the Church. We are sent forth to be the good news. Advent is about waiting and anticipating, Christmas is about celebrating the birth of Jesus, the Savior, and Easter is about Christ's victory over sin and death, but Pentecost is about receiving the Holy Spirit in the name of Jesus. Pentecost was an ancient Jewish feast, one of the three most important among all

the Jewish feasts. God the Father and Jesus chose this feast as the time to send the Holy Spirit upon God's new Kingdom. For this occasion, God gave special gifts to his apostles, allowing them to proclaim God's favor to people of every nation. In the earlier events, we are passive participants, we have received all power and authority in the name of Jesus, and when we have the power and authority of the Holy Spirit, the evil one will tremble and flee.

The Church with the power of the Holy Spirit will increase the level of expectancy, become an instrument of God's healing power, and be a cause of great joy. An unbelieving world will experience awe and amazement as it witnesses God's signs and wonders, finally becoming a credible witness of God's kingdom of love and justice. As a church that has received the Holy Spirit, we will be able to transform any situation. We will have the power to heal and renew our families, we will bring peace to the communities; we will care for one another and for Mother Earth.

It is because of the power of the Holy Spirit that Jesus warned his disciples that the world will hate them and all who believed in him. He warned them that they would be thrown out of the temple, ridiculed, persecuted, and, yes, even killed. But there was no need to worry or live behind locked doors trembling in fear, because he would not leave them or us alone. He would send his Spirit, the gift of wisdom, the counselor and Spirit of truth, who would remain with them and Christ's church until the end of time.

The great Feast of Pentecost is the fulfillment of that promise. On that day, the power of God turned despairing, fearful people into dynamic disciples. They had received the Holy Spirit and were clothed with power from on high. In his death and resurrection, Jesus' mission on earth was completed according to God's plan, but he knew that the mission of proclaiming the Good News – of setting the captives free – needed to be proclaimed to the far ends of the earth unto all generations until the end of times. Jesus gives his disciples and he gives us, with the power of the Holy Spirit, to be and proclaim the

Good News wherever we go. If we are faithful in bearing witness to the life-changing gospel we will find joy in seeing God's favor bestowed in the poor, the suffering, and rejected.

Pentecost is about the miracle of God's transformative grace – seeing those who have been broken in life becoming oaks of righteousness. Let us go forth as church filled with the anointing and power of the Holy Spirit and renew the face of the earth. Let us go out to the far corners of our neighborhoods, cities, nations, and world to be the people of the way; let us be the God-lovers wrapped in the authority and power of the Holy Spirit and proclaim to the world that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father! Amen.

PREPARING FOR SACRAMENTS

Our Church has seven amazing sacraments that were instituted by Christ. Each sacrament is a true blessing and we should look to witness to them whenever possible. From the Baptism of a baby to the First Communion of a young person to the ordination of someone to the priesthood or deaconate, we are truly blessed whenever we see a sacrament being conferred. There are beautiful ceremonies and rites associated with each sacrament. While a specific event (a wedding, a baptism, etc.) is important and we want the event to be glorious, we need people to look

beyond the event and into a life-long relationship with God. This is why our Church does not just allow people to jump into a sacrament unprepared. We want to ensure that people understand the sacrament, appreciate its salvific meaning, and integrate the sacrament into their spiritual life.

For baptism, the priest or deacon meets with the parents (and preferably the godparents) to discuss why they want their child baptized. We usually look for an answer beyond "to wash away original sin." The question is important because baptism is a commitment to introduce God and the Church to the child continually throughout their life. The parents should know that the Church does not expect the next time we see the child to be at First Communion but at Mass every Sunday. The role of the godparent is not ceremonial but spiritual as well. They are promising to help raise the child in the Catholic Church too.

We are in that time of year when we typically see first or second graders making their First Communion. Many of these young ones have been getting instruction through school as well as through their family. It looks so precious seeing all these young ones wearing white dresses or suits but they've been preparing, understanding that they are receiving the true flesh of Christ. Again, this is a sacrament not about family photo opportunities but about spiritual growth.

Perhaps one of the more underappreciated preparation periods is for the sacrament of Confirmation. While in Baptism, someone else spoke up for the child being baptized, this is the chance for the individual being confirmed to reflect on personal responsibility for their continued spiritual growth. They identify a sponsor, who provides one-onone mentoring about the faith and allows the person being confirmed (whether a youth, teen, or grown adult in RCIA/ OCIA) to ask more personal questions about the Church.

The Catholic Church perhaps has given greatest attention to marriage preparation. It is easy for a couple to get so fixated on their wedding that they fail to prepare for their marriage, the true sacrament that starts at the wedding. For many of us old-timers, we went through Pre-Cana, a series of classes meant to ensure the engaged couple was talking about what was really involved in a marriage and a sacrament. No, it was not intended to make couples fight with each other but it was intended to ensure they talked meaningfully about life after the wedding, including topics that couple sometimes find uncomfortable.

In many parishes, Pre-Cana has been replaced with Marriage Mentoring, a process of matching an engaged couple with a married couple. This allows the marriage preparation to be more personalized to the engaged couple. It provides the engaged couple with many tools to use to help in future communication with each other.

There is also highly specialized preparation for the other sacraments, especially Holy Orders, but hopefully you get the point that the Church does not view sacraments as a one-time event in order to have family and friends over for a party. They are deep, meaningful starts to continued growth in our relationship with God. The Church ensures we approach them appropriately through preparation.

BECOMING A DEACON - APPLYING FOR THE PROGRAM

Applying for the deacon formation program is a foreshadowing of the workload we will encounter in the actual program. As you might imagine, they have a form you need to complete to gather basic background information. They have you also get copies of your sacramental records (baptism, first communion, confirmation, and marriage). They even want copies of education records from high school, college, and certification programs. The aspirant writes a letter to the bishop expressing interest in entering the deaconate. If married, his wife completes a series of questions indicating her impression on whether her husband is fit for the

program.

The most involved part of the application is writing an autobiography of your life. They want to know about your family upbringing, your marriage, your employment, and your involvement in parish activities. It then wraps up with an essay answering the question about how you think you are being called to the deaconate. It gives the diocese a sense of whether you are willing to put in the work for the program as well as insight into who you are.



Our St. Francis of Assisi missionaries Fr. Antonio, Ilene Rainwater, Grace Rapien, and Rose Rapien will once again be travelling to Marsella, Colombia! Fr. Antonio began this Mission 20 years ago in 2005 as a non-profit Mission dedicated to helping the most vulnerable in Colombia and he has been taking missionaries to Colombia every year ever since. During the trip, missionaries walk through the streets of Marsella (pronounced mar-say-shuh) just like the Apostles did over 2000 years ago pro-

claiming the words of Christ to all the people they encounter. The people of Marsella look forward to this Mission trip every year and welcome our missionaries with open arms and hearts! The missionaries attend daily Mass, visit the homebound, assist in facilitating a Vacation Bible School (VBS) for approximately 150 children, distribute upwards of 250 food bags to needy families, and immerse themselves in daily Colombian life - all while enjoying fabulous Colombian food, fellowship, and the natural beauty of Colombia!
