WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?

The Book of Deuteronomy is a series of sermons addressed to the people of Israel by Moses right before they were to enter the Promised Land. Moses knew he would die before the people could enter their Promised Land, so he is in a way giving them some last words of wisdom before he would have to leave them.

Today's first reading begins with an incomplete sentence: "If only you would heed the word of the Lord" The sentence implies that God would bless them greatly "if only they would heed the voice of the Lord" The passage goes on to stress that people do not have to guess what

God wants from them. It's not a hidden mystery. This concept connects with today's gospel - the story of the good Samaritan. When the scholar of the Law asked Jesus what God wants from us, Jesus's reply to the man shows that the man already knew the answer to his question. Almost instinctively we all know what God wants of us. Knowing is not the problem. Living it is.

The answer the Lawyer gives to his own question is an answer we all know – to love God with our whole being and to love our neighbor as we love ourselves. Loving our neighbor is not a Jewish Law; it is what all religions believe in. It is called the golden rule: "do unto others as you would have them do to you."

In the time of Jesus, love of neighbor applied only to fellow Israelites. Eventually this law was extended also to foreigners living in Israel but not to others. Jesus extended the law even to loving one's enemies. Indeed, this story of the Good Samaritan illustrates this. To the Jewish mind no Samaritan was good. There was hostility between the Jews and the Samaritans that went back hundreds of years.

The law is meant to create an environment that fosters love, creativity, and love of God and neighbor. The law is meant to set us free, not confine us. It is through the law that we come to have life fully in God. It is through the law that our eyes are opened to the marginalized, the suffering, the neglected and our hearts become open to welcome them in.

So, when the scholar asks the question "and who is my neighbor?" it is not meant to be a restricted group of people who live next to us that we should love as ourselves; the law should open our hearts and our love for all God's people, each of whom is created in his image. Mercy is the result of the law. Love of God and adherence to the law should not cause us to judge others or be condescending toward others or even to be hostile to those who do not follow the law. Rather we see that the love leads to mercy.

We are called to be merciful all the time and to everyone, even when it does not fit into our schedule. With this, today's gospel is not meant to be restrictive and exclusionary but liberating and inclusive, and following the law is meant to open our hearts so that we can act with love and mercy to our neighbors. It can show even to our enemies the presence and compassion of our all-loving Father.

THE SACRAMENT OF EUCHARIST (PART 2)

The heart of the sacrament of Eucharist is the Mass. There are times though where it is not possible to get to Mass or to have a Mass said. For those that are sick or homebound, they are unable to get to Mass. There are also times when a priest is not available to say Mass. The Church emphasizes that in these circumstances, it is important for people to still receive the Precious Body of Christ.

Because consecrated hosts must be handled appropriately and reverently, the Church defines who may distribute the Precious Body. You may be aware that the Church does not allow ordinary people to distribute the Precious Body, but the primary people that distribute Holy Communion are the "Ordinary" ministers of the Church. Priests and deacons are the Ordinary ministers of the Holy Communion by virtue of their ordination.

To assist priests and deacons, the Church commissions Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMOHC). These people are trained on how to distribute both the Precious Body and Blood of Christ and then receive a blessing to help with Holy Communion. An EMOHC can help with Holy Communion during Mass or take Holy Communion to the sick or homebound.

To take Holy Communion to the sick or homebound, the priest, deacon, or EMOHC places the consecrated host in a pyx, a small round vessel which locks close to safeguard the consecrated host. The pyx is to be placed inside a burse, a small pouch to carry a pyx reverently. The burse is supposed to allow the pyx to be carried near the heart. The Precious Blood cannot be taken to the sick or homebound, only the Precious Body. The pyx should be cleaned with holy water to ensure any leftover pieces of the Precious Body are either consumed or poured directly to the ground.

When a priest is unavailable to say a Mass, a parish may have a Communion Service in place of the Mass. Our parish offers Communion Services when Fr. Antonio is out of town. A Communion Service should be led by an ordained deacon but when no deacon is available either, it may be led by a layperson the pastor appoints. A Communion Service eliminates the parts of a Mass reserved for a priest, specifically the consecration of the bread and wine. A Communion Service incorporates hosts previously consecrated by a priest.

The sacrament of Eucharist adds grace whenever it is received so it is understandable why people may want to receive Holy Communion multiple times in a day. While the Church considers it important for everyone to receive Holy Communion whenever they can, the Church limits a person to receiving Holy Communion twice in one day. This limit was put into place because some people started to try to collect grace through Holy Communion like collecting tokens in a video game. The Church views this practice as abusing the sacrament so they put the limit in place. Priests are given dispensation from the limit when they are having to say more than two Masses in a day.

A very heartfelt THANK YOU from One Heart Colombia Mission for the generous response to supporting our food bag program. Your donations helped supply almost 70, YES! 70 bags of the 250 we were able to provide this year. This was a significant help to be able to distribute much needed help to so many families of Marsella. Each bag contains enough food to help feed a family of four for about 10 days. In addition to the food bag, we were also able to include a 5 pound bag of potatoes, 5 bags of milk, a large package of crackers, a bag of laundry products, AND 3 dozen eggs!! All together almost 50 pounds - that somehow they managed to carry to their homes!

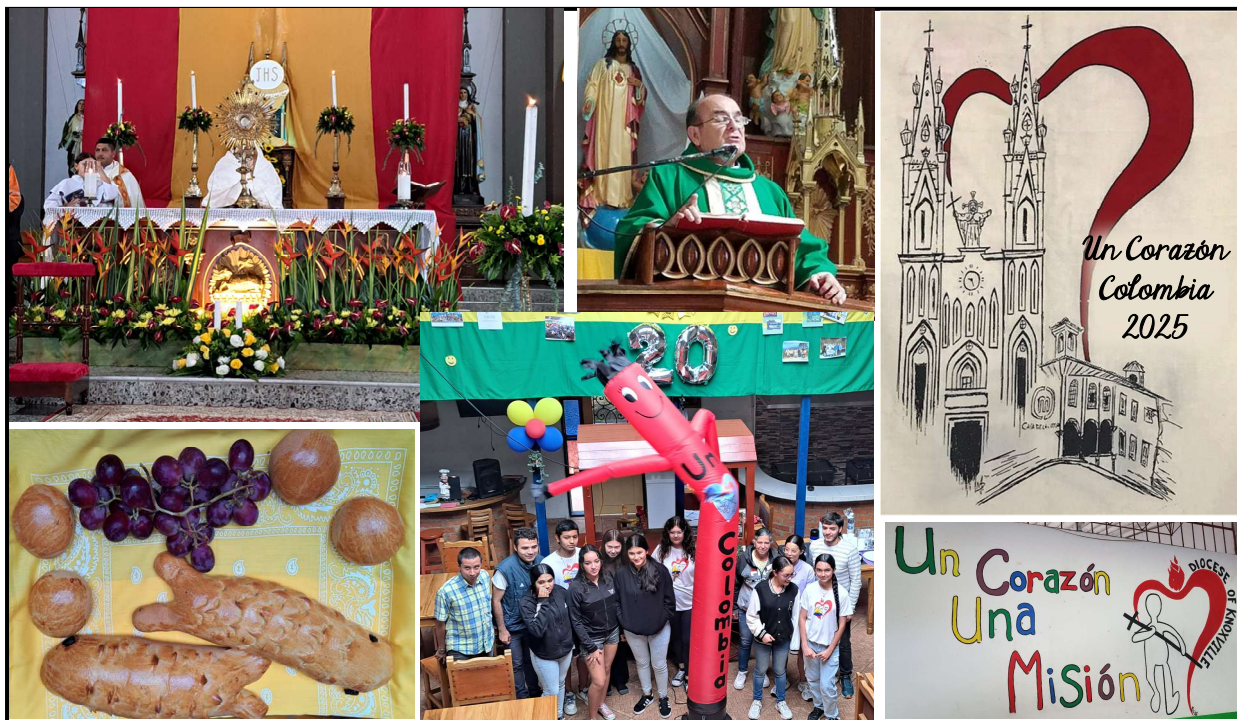
150 of these bags are given to the children attending the 3-day Vacation Bible School. The theme this year was HOPE, highlighting the Bible readings of Noah's Ark, The Ten Commandments, and the Transfiguration. (FYI: we filled 8 suitcases with supplies for VBS activities). The last day ended with a lunch of rice and shredded pork, with many of the children eating very little or none so they could take it home to their family.

35 bags are reserved for the "Sponsor" children. The Sponsor program is supported by individuals who contribute a monthly stipend to help support additional or unexpected expenses that might occur. These children must attend Mass regularly, maintain good grades, and attend monthly meetings.

The remaining bags go to the elderly, families with little income, and the nursing home.

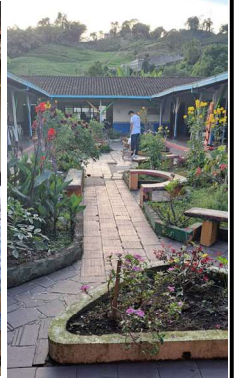
Besides the food and VBS, we also spend time visiting homes. We pray with them and try to bring a little love and kindness into their lives. We leave rosaries, medals, crucifixes, and other religious items with them to let them know we care and will pray for them. Many of us cannot actually experience the Mission, but by supporting or praying for its continued success the people of Marsella will be greatly blessed.

**WE WALKED WITH JESUS. NOW WE RUN.
A REFLECTION ON THE PILGRIMAGE
AND THANKSGIVING FOR THE MOVEMENT THAT CONTINUES**

For five unforgettable weeks, pilgrims on the St. Katharine Drexel Route carried Jesus in the Eucharist across ten states and twenty-four (arch)dioceses and (arch)eparchies. Through heat, tears, music, and mystery, the ordinary became extraordinary. Streets became sanctuaries. Strangers became family. Our Precious Lord was adored.

This pilgrimage wasn't about reaching a destination, it was about an encounter. Transformation. Revival. We saw revival unfold in real time.

A FIRE THAT'S SPREADING

From Indiana to Illinois, Iowa to Oklahoma, Texas to California, we witnessed revival not as a concept, but a *living reality*. People gathered because they were hungry for the Eucharist. They used the word *revival* not to describe an initiative, but to articulate a longing that had caught fire in their hearts. This wasn't a program. It was personal. And it was contagious.

MOMENTS OF EUCHARISTIC AMAZEMENT

Catholic faithful, young and old knelt to adore the Lord in local parishes, football stadiums, missions and along the side of the road while a caravan of pilgrims drove past. Priests offered walking confessions during numerous Eucharistic Processions and choirs helped worship to overflow during Masses. Perpetual Pilgrims visited shrines of Blessed Stanley Rother, Archbishop Fulton Sheen, and Venerable Emil Kapaun. The Perpetual Pilgrim team also had the honor of visiting multiple sites with direct ties to St. Katharine Drexel in Missouri, Oklahoma and Arizona, including Navajo Nation in the Diocese of Gallup.

In Peoria, Jesus in the Monstrance was lifted into the skies in a helicopter blessing, then sailed across the Mississippi like a scene straight out of the lives of the apostles. Pilgrims served meals to the homeless in several cities, including the streets of Los Angeles, and brought Jesus to inmates in prison in Texas. They also visited the sick and elderly in hospice care. Pilgrims embraced the charisms of service and love of St. Katharine and discovered Christ in the faces of those they encountered. It felt as if the Gospels were coming to life. And in many ways, they were.

As I recall the events of today, I am convicted by the faith of others that I've witnessed. May we all have that same bold faith that leads us to go the distance for the sake of Love, whether that's hundreds of miles, or simply an arm's stretch away."

THE REVIVAL WALKS THROUGH SUFFERING, TOO

Not every stop was joyful. There was prayer in communities ravaged by wildfires and several stops along the way faced anti-Catholic protests. And in Los Angeles, due to safety concerns amid unrest, the closing citywide procession had to be changed. But the pilgrimage did not end in defeat. In a private moment during the conclusion of Corpus Christi events, Jesus was still carried into the streets of L.A., and Archbishop Joseph Gomez offered a blessing over the city - a powerful act of hope and healing in a wounded world.

This revival doesn't avoid suffering. It passes through it, transfigured by grace.

THIS IS NOT THE END. IT NEVER WAS.

Corpus Christi Sunday doesn't close the book on the National Eucharistic Revival. It simply marks the turning of a page. We are frequently asked, "What comes next?" Our answer is simple: **We walked with Jesus. Now we run.** The Church needs witnesses on fire. And we need you.

If you've been moved by this pilgrimage, by the faces, the stories, the sheer faith of it all, don't let it stay in a document somewhere or on the screen and let it end there. Let it live in you. We are building a movement of Eucharistic Missionaries: everyday Catholics, just like you, who carry the fire of revival into their own parishes and communities.

Your personal love for Jesus in the Eucharist was never meant to stay private. It's meant to light up your home, your parish, your community.

We're inviting you to become a Eucharistic Missionary: someone who carries the fire of revival home. You don't have to walk 3,000 miles. But you can invite someone to Mass. You can lead a Holy Hour. Lead a small group. You can tell your own story of how Jesus in the Eucharist changed your life. Say "YES" to the Spirit moving in your life.

It's simple. It's free. And it starts with your yes. **Hope Has a Name. And We Carried Him.** Across deserts and mountains, highways and small-town streets, we carried the Eucharistic Heart of Jesus. Now, He walks with you. Let's carry Him forward together.
