THE ART OF HUMILITY



We all have different God-given gifts. Today all three readings speak of humility. And to be humble is to use the gifts God gives us. In a book by St. Louis de Montfort called *True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin*, de Montfort paints a pretty sad picture: He writes, "We are prouder than peacocks, more envious than serpents, more gluttonous than hogs, more furious than tigers, lazier than tortoises, and more fickle than roosters."

When Jesus says, "Go and sit in the lowest place," He is warning us about the sin of pride. All too easily, we become self-centered, prouder than peacocks, and the more self-centered we are, the more we forget about God. How easily we slip into pride, into self-centeredness. St. Bernard of Clairvaux describes it as a slippery slope.

One of the signs of indicating pride is bragging. There is a difference between bragging and celebrating. When we have done good, we celebrate because we have used well the talents that God gave us. Jesus tells us "Let your light shine before others" (MT 5:16). Celebrating when we've done good is to rejoice in the gifts God gave us. But Christ also warns us, "Do not sound your trumpet just so others will praise you" (MT 6:12). When we start to arrogantly pat each other on the back, that's bragging. We've started down the slippery slope to sin. We begin marching around prouder than peacocks! We slip into the next step to self-centeredness. We think to ourselves, "Since I'm so good, MY ways of doing things are the best. So do it my way, let my will be done." How easily we slide into the sin of pride.

Celebrating our achievements so easily, becomes tooting our own horn. Being accomplished tempts us to insist on everything being done according to our will. In humility, we admit, we do sin. When we become prouder than peacocks, crowing like roosters, we forget God.

So where does that leave us? We are God's blessed children, but we have a tendency to sin. How do we act with humility? Blessed are the humble, Jesus says. But what does humility call us to do? First, be the good disciple. Remember when the mother of Zebedee's sons asks that her sons sit one on the left, the other on the right, when Christ came into his Kingdom? Jesus answered, "Can you drink the cup that I am going to drink?" (MT 20: 20-23) It is life with Jesus that brings us honor.

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us another way of humility. Christ says, "When you hold a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind." Invite those who cannot repay you. Because all people are equal in God's eye. All are loved by God. Blessed are we when we treat everyone as an image of God.

One year, my old parish invited the homeless in the town we lived in to come in for breakfast one Sunday after the Masses. A great idea. Except that all the guests were seated on one side of the hall, and the parishioners on the other. With humility, we sit with our guests, with our brothers and sisters in Christ.

A third way of humility: Jesus says, "Take the lowest place." When Cardinal Joseph Bernardin was first made a Bishop, his mother echoed the advice of Christ. His mother told her son, "Walk straight and try not to look too pleased with yourself." The Prayer of St. Francis gives us good advice about taking the lowest place. St. Francis says, "Lord make me an instrument of your peace. Let me seek not so much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love.

SUFFERING – PART TWO

When we are suffering from pain, illness, distress, or tragedy, it is human nature to wonder why we are suffering, especially if we are good, religious people. Why do bad things happen to good people? Some people will even ask the question “Why is God punishing me?” or “Why is God testing me?”

Well, a surprising answer is that it may not be God that is punishing you. We tend to not give credit to Satan for all the evil in the world and for when bad things happen in our lives. Nothing pleases Satan more than to turn a good person away from God. There is one book in the Bible that is the perfect example of someone trying to understand God punishing him and not acknowledging Satan.

Job was an upright man who the Lord loved. Satan told God that Job would turn on Him if tragedy were to befall him. God told Satan to have at Job but he could not physically harm Job. Satan had raiders come and steal Job's oxen and donkeys and kill his servants. Satan had flames come from above and killed Job's sheep and shepherds. He had another set of raiders take Job's camels and kill those servants watching over them. Finally, Job's ten children were all eating a meal together in a large house and Satan had the walls and roof fall down and crush Job's children.

Job was heartbroken but did not lose faith in the Lord. Satan told God that Job's faith would surely falter if God wasn't protecting Job physically. God gave permission to Satan to cause physical harm to Job as long as Satan didn't kill Job. Satan had Job covered with boils from head to toe.

Job was in agony and trying to understand what he could have done to offend the Lord. His wife and friends were urging him to repent for his sins but he kept telling them that he had no idea what he could repent for but that God must have a reason. He wanted to ask God why he was being punished.

Finally, Job gets the opportunity to ask God. God's unexpected response was to lecture Job on how he could question anything God does. Job accepted that answer and God healed him and started to restore his prosperity.

God never promised us that we would have pain-free lives. He promised to be there for us and that if we trust in Him, things will work out for the best. “The best” may not be here on earth but ultimately, there will be something better for us after the suffering is over.

Satan is going to challenge us to lose faith in God. He does it by imparting suffering, by taking innocent lives, by causing all sorts of mayhem in the world. We must have faith that God has faith in us. And if nothing else, we should take it as a compliment that God views us as He did Job. Keep faith in God regardless of what happens but also give Satan his due for much of the suffering in the world.

DEACON'S NOTES (CONTINUED)

How do we live the way of humility? As God's blessed children, we give love without counting the costs, we serve those who cannot repay us, we take the lowest place.

Jesus concludes his teaching in today's Gospel by telling us, “You will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous.” There is only one banquet that really counts. It's in heaven, and God himself is the host. At the heavenly banquet, Christ's words will be repeated, “Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted.”

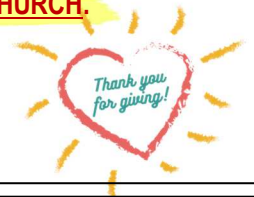

Healing prayers will be for emotional, physical and/or spiritual healing.

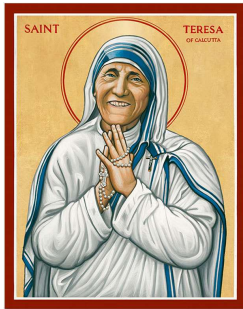
